CHIPS

Hewn Out of Local Material With Our Little Hatchet.

The police have been notified to look out for and arrest James Cleary, who escaped from the Towson town (Md.) jail.

It is proposed to have a bench show of dogs in this city, and the skating rink has been secured for a week in February for that purpose.

Lucy Hephard was arrested on Seventh street Saturday on the charge of stealing a toy carriage. She was locked up and will pay Judge Snell a visit this morning.

The Cosmos club has secured new quarters at No. 23 Lafayette square, which has been very costly fitted up, and the club will give a house warming on Thursday night next.

The Capital yesterday was remarkably interesting. The translation of Bacon's talk about our public men was the feature of the paper. The society news was very complete.

On Saturday Mr. C. M. Smith, counsel for Mr. William Dickson, and Mr. H. H. Wells, who represents the government, requested the postponement of the trial until tomorrow, and Judge Snell consented.

There is a movement on foot among our business men to send the Washington Light Infantry to New Orleans in February next to contest for a \$3,000 prize which is to be offered for the best drilled military company.

On Saturday night Eva Wallace got into a row with her landlady, Minnie Crown, during which the madam struck Eva over the head with a poker, making a ugly cut across the right eye. Both parties were locked up.

Charley Hall, a colored boy, was severely burned by his clothes taking fire while alone in a room in house 124 Madison alley. Dr. Morrison was called, and he cut away the clothing, but the child is in a very dangerous condition.

The causeway over the long bridge is in a bad condition, covered with water; teams passing over have to splash through and when it freezes are in great danger of slipping and falling. So says Maj. King, who inspected the place last evening.

A boy employed in Velate's candy store was cut in the hand with a knife on Saturday night while trying to capture another boy who was endeavoring to steal from the store. The would-be thief escaped, and the boy was taken to the emergency hospital, where his wound was dressed.

Mr. A. E. Leslie, superintendent of the Mutual Union Telegraph company, was on Wednesday presented with an elegant gold headed ebony cane, gold scabbard pin, with diamond setting, a handsome silver fash and matchbox, all appropriately marked, by the operators in his office.

At the semi-annual inspection of steam boilers and maceating cylinders of the Bureau of engraving and printing on Saturday last by Steamboat Boiler Inspector Saville all the boilers and apparatus were found to be in perfect order, and not a single suggestion as to repairs could be made.

The new rooms of the Columbia boat club on New York avenue are very elaborately fitted up, the reception room having rich Turkish carpets, while handsome pictures adorn the walls. There is also a billiard room and a gymnasium, the latter equipped with rowing machines, parallel bars, and other appliances to preserve the proper rigidity of the muscles.

The case of Clayton H. Buell, charged with an indecent assault on a little girl named Josephine Gudgin, of which mention has already been made in THE REPUBLICAN, was heard in the police court, Saturday, and the defendant dismissed, as the testimony did not support the charge. It was developed in the testimony that Mr. Buell is not an employee of the center market, but is an official of the district government lately appointed, and given supervision of matters connected with the center and wholesale markets. The charge against Mr. Buell fell in pieces before the questions of the court and the prosecuting attorney, and Mr. Buell was warmly congratulated at the result.

SATURDAY'S POLICE COURT NOTES.

James Johnson, alias James Hill, was charged with stealing a bolt of lace from the store of Gunnip, Day & Co. It was said that this was a second offense of petit larceny, and the case was continued for proof of the prior one.

James Bryan was given sixty days in jail for stealing a hip robe, and thirty days additional for stealing a carving knife and fork.

In the case of Barbara Kelley, charged with keeping an unlicensed bar at 1312 E street northwest, it was shown that Policemen Edlin and Skidmore went into the woman's place in citizen's clothes, and that she sent out for the drinks. Judge Snell said that he was opposed to this mode of proceeding, where the money is furnished and the party sent out and enticed to break the law, and he took the personal bonds of the defendant not to repeat the offense.

Judge Snell will hold a session of the police court this morning at 7 o'clock, to accommodate those who commenced their Christmas on Saturday night.
