### CHIPS

Hewn Out of Local Material With Our Little Hatchet.

Thirty-eight arrests were made by the police yesterday during the twenty-four hours ending at 7 a. m. yesterday morning.

During an altercation in Shepherd's alley, between William Dorsey and J. H. Miner, Miner was seriously hurt. Dorsey was arrested.

John Hayes, driver of a milk wagon, yesterday afternoon, about half past 3 o'clock, ran over a white woman named Mary Casson, at the corner of Seventh and New York Avenue, slightly injuring the woman.

Yesterday afternoon a carriage owned by Col. Patterson, containing two ladies, was suddenly turned around and badly smashed on M street near Tenth street, by the horse taking fright at some fire crackers. The ladies received no injury other than a shaking up.

Mr. Henry Ruppert left his horse and carriage in charge of a colored boy in front of the National theater yesterday afternoon about five o'clock. The horse took fright at some boys and ran away, tearing down E street to Fourth street, up Fourth street to Massachusetts Avenue, up Massachusetts Avenue to Tenth street, and down Tenth street to Pennsylvania Avenue, where the horse slipped and fell. Fortunately for the boy he sprung out and escaped injury. The carriage was slightly damaged.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CELEBRATION. The Swedenborgian Sunday school had a most pleasant Christmas celebration in the parlors of the Swedenborgian business college yesterday afternoon which was very largely attended. Rev. Jacob Fox, the pastor of the church, aided in making the occasion a happy one. There was a beautifully filled Christmas tree, and every child was the recipient of a handsome present.

AN OARSMAN'S DEATH. Mr. Charles M. Henderson, a prominent young man of this city, died Sunday. Mr. Henderson was a clerk in the coast survey and a member of the Columbia boat club, having pulled bow oar in the Fredericksburg regatta, when the Columbus secured first prize. He was scarcely 21, and was regarded as one of the most promising oarsmen of the club. He was also well known in society circles. The Columbia boat club held a meeting yesterday, and appointed a committee to draft resolutions. They decided to attend the funeral in a body, which takes place at 2 o'clock to-day.

A CHRISTMAS ROW. About 7 o'clock last night Officer Smith, hearing cries of murder issuing from a house on Madison street, between Sixth and Seventh and M and N streets, repaired to the scene and attempted to arrest Dan Davis, who, with his brother Joe, commenced to curse and defy the officer's authority. Dan picked up an ax and started to strike the officer over the head, when a general melee ensued, during which the officer lost his baton and nippers. When the officer lost his baton he drew his revolver and fired at the men, but did not hit them. He then arrested Minnie Payne for interfering with him in the discharge of his duty. The men escaped, but will be caught, as they are well known.

WEST WASHINGTON. The attendance at the services of the Catholic and Episcopal churches yesterday was unusually large, the fine weather bringing out a great number of worshippers. The decorations were quite elaborate and tasteful, and the musical programmes as published in THE REPUBLICAN were carried out in a highly creditable manner.
