Mr. P. Maloney, a contractor who has done a good deal of work in this city, has been awarded a \$50,000 contract to build a main sewer in Columbus, Ohio.

Mr. William A. Lackey will be tendered, the latter part of this month, a benefit under the charge of the Carroll Institute. The Lawrence Barrett club will participate.

Mr. Charles Elliott, attorney for Galen E. Green, charged with forgery, on Saturday gave bonds in the sum of \$500 for the appearance of the defendant, who is confined to his bed by illness.

The funeral of Mrs. Catherine Cahill, the venerable mother of Daniel E. Cahill, esq., will take place this morning from her late residence, No. 511 Second street northwest, and there will be requiem mass at St. Aloysius church.
