The Washington Market company yester-
 day declared a dividend of 25 cents a share
 on the capital stock.

The cornerstone of the Mount Jerreel Baptist

The Washington Produce exchange, at its
 meeting yesterday, re-elected John Cassel
 president and S. W. Curriden secretary.

The amount of money realized by the festival
 for the benefit of the Poor Children's
 Society, given by Misses Jessie Daniels
 and Minnie Jenkins, was \$1,100.

At the commencement of St. Joseph's
 academy at Emmettsburg, Md., Miss C. Frey-
 hold, of this city, received a prize for excel-
 lence in English studies in the second inter-
 mediate.

The secretary of war has informed the
 superintendent of the reform school, Mr.
 Shallenberger, that there is no authority
 of law or regulations under which a flag can be
 furnished the reform school, as requested by
 the superintendent.

The Washington Press club excursion takes
 place on Monday night on the steamer Con-
 coran. All the friends of the newspaper man
 are invited to participate. The Apollo club
 is to sing some of its choicest gems. Dancing
 and music at Marshall Hall.

Cross-ties have been placed on the piles
 driven by Ross & Sandford the entire distance
 from the Arsenal to the terminus, near the
 Long bridge, and nothing now remains but to
 lay the rails before the dump cars can be run

Yesterday morning a horse attached to a
