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LAW OF LABOR.

Chambers of Wisdom Evolved Yesterday Before the Senatorial Subcommittee.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—James K. Ingalls was the first witness to-day before the senate subcommittee on labor and education.

In his opinion the holding of large tracts of land by single individuals was dangerous to the interests of society and labor.

He had the effect of drawing so much land from the market and thus creating fictitious values in real estate.

Witness thought that no man should possess an absolute fee of the land, but that he should only own the use of so much land as was necessary to his comfort during his life.

He recommended a change in the law by which a man's executor should have the power to dispose of his real property as he did not require him to sing seamanship notes and he was not present when this was requested to sing.

The Trotting Meeting at Point Breeze Park—Races at Brighton Beach.

Twister won the first heat, Dollie Fawn the second, Twister the third, Little Splan the fourth, Gossip, Jr., the fifth, and Twister the sixth and the race. Splan was awarded second money, Gossip, Jr., third, and Fawn fourth. Ben Johnson was distanced in the fourth heat, and Jack Rapid was distanced in the sixth heat.
