Arrival of the Distinguished English Jurist at the National Capital.

Brilliant Reception in His Honor by the Secretary of State.

Upon the arrival of Lord Chief Justice Coleridge yesterday afternoon he was received at the Sixth street depot by a committee of the Bar association of the District of Columbia, composed as follows: R. The distinguished visitor was escorted to Wormaly's, where a suite of nine rooms, located on the second floor and fronting on H and Fourteenth streets, had been reserved for his lordship and party. Shortly after reaching the hotel the secretary of state called, and was presented to the lord chief justice by Attorney General Brewster.
