Thieves forced an entrance into Francis Buckingham's candy store, 1223 Pennsylvania Avenue, on Thursday night, but only obtained some small change from the money drawer.

The church of the Epiphany has been closed during the past week. It has been newly carpeted, and will be open on Sunday and for the regular daily services hereafter.

Postmaster Conger yesterday appointed W. K. Davidson to succeed C. L. Stoney, stamp agent at the corner of Maryland Avenue and Eleventh Street southwest, and Mr. John R. Burton as a substitute clerk in the city post-office.

The remains of Sergt. Asken, of the artillery service, who died on Wednesday, were yesterday interred at the Arlington National cemetery, a firing party and pallbearers escorting them. All the artillery companies at the arsenal and the band accompanied the party to the gates of the arsenal.

The first case ever called in the police court in which a wholesale liquor dealer was charged with selling on Sunday was brought yesterday morning. Mr. John Alberts being the defendant. Mr. L. Browning for the defense, claimed that the law of 1867, under which the charge is brought, was repealed by the law of 1874. The case was suspended, so that it can be taken up to the supreme court on a certiorari.

The marriage of Mr. William H. Holmes, of the United States geological survey office, to Miss Kate C. Osgood was solemnized Wednesday evening at the residence of the bride's parents, No. 2301 Fourteenth Street, northwest. Rev. Dr. Chester officiating. The happy couple received many congratulations and a number of elaborate presents. After the ceremony a beautiful collation was served, and at 10 p. m. the newly married couple went to their future home, No. 1109 O Street.

Delay in Suburban Travel.

On Wednesday evening the 120 train on the Washington, Ohio and Western railway, from Washington to Falls Church, was over two hours late, and the residents of the latter place complain that delays of this kind are exasperatingly common. A large number of them have signed a letter to the superintendent of the road saying that "many people have been obliged to leave Falls Church, Herndon, and the neighboring towns on account of the poor and uncertain railroad accommodations, and others are preparing to leave. The arrangement by which the afternoon train from Washington is compelled to wait for the mail train to pass, and often to go to Alexandria and return, seems to be unnecessary, and the delays which it occasions are frequent and very exasperating."
