Swinging electric lights of high power have been suspended in front of the east and north fronts of the treasury department. The effect at night is said to be very pretty.

The funeral of Frederick Tolliver took place at St. Dominic's church, yesterday morning and was largely attended. The interment was made at Mount Olivet.

The congregation of St. John's P. E. church have just received a pair of 4-foot panel pictures, representing St. John and St. James. The pictures are in oil and were painted by Rev. Mr. Oertel, of this city.

The Old Orator.

Death of Dr. W. G. H. Newman.

Dr. W. G. H. Newman, a well known physician, died at his residence, No. 2403 Pennsylvania avenue, yesterday morning at the age of 56. He was of an old Maryland family, and after graduating at Washington college, Maryland, and Jefferson college, Pennsylvania, in 1848, he entered upon the practice of medicine in this district, where he has lived ever since. At the time of his death he was chief of the staff of St. Ann's infant asylum, which position he had held for fifteen years, and was one of the board of directors of Providence hospital. He had been also police surgeon for twenty-one years, a member of the old board of health, chairman of the board of visitors of the Washington asylum for a number of years, and was at one time a member of the city council of the corporation of Washington. His funeral will take place to-morrow morning, and requiem mass will be said at St. Stephen's church at 10 o'clock.
