Washington Normal School.

The first quarterly examination of this school was held in the Franklin building yesterday, commencing at 9:30 a. m. and closing at 12:30 p. m.

The school consists of its well-known principal, Miss L. E. Smith, Miss Edith M. Pittis and Miss Margaret Maher, assistants, each in charge of one of the practice schools; Mrs. S. E. Fuller, teacher of drawing, and Mr. F. H. Butterfield, teacher of vocal music. There are twenty-five pupil teachers receiving instruction. The subjects of the examination yesterday were: Botany, drawing, music, zoology, physical exercises, object teaching, and methods. The object of the school is to give to its pupils the theory and practice of teaching and not a knowledge of the subjects to be taught; the latter they are expected to have acquired before entering this professional building.

From this point of view the examination was one of rare interest, and the young ladies gave good evidence of their adaptability for the work of the profession which they are looking to, and a satisfactory prospect for the first term of the year. They exhibited remarkable skill in the use of the crayon on the blackboard, especially in rapidly delineating the forms of animals and insects that had been made subjects of their observation and study. A large number of visitors were present, including the superintendent, some of the supervising principals, and teachers of the public schools, ex-trustees French and Wilson, President Warner, and Trustees Lovjoy, Baum, and Clark, of the school board.

Failure of Florida Orange Crop.

A gentleman writing from Citra, Fla., Nov. 13, to a friend in this city, says: "I have been through the grove and was so badly disappointed that I do not like to write to you about it, but will tell you at once that, as far as my judgment goes and that of every one else, the crop will be very light. All the groves on the Orange lake are very bare of fruit. I shall not have one-third of a crop. The wet weather and high wind in February and March when the trees were in blossom, stripped them of a large portion of their blossoms, and then, the dry weather coming on so early in the fall, they stopped growing and are very small. However, I am not cast down. My grove is in a splendid condition, and there is a fortune to be made, if only I shall commence picking to-morrow. Your grove is in fine growing order, and has put on a large growth, but will have no fruit this season."
