THE BREVITY BASKET.

Filled With Brief Mention of Many Minor Events of Yesterday.

The alarm from box 51 yesterday morning was caused by the burning of a two-story frame house on a lot south of the capitol. The damage was slight.

A project is on foot to erect a monument over the remains of the late D. A. Bronson, the expenses to be raised by subscriptions from his fellow countrymen.

George Winkelman, of Cincinnati, a brother in law of Joe Gorhardt, has signed to play second base and change pitcher for the Nationals, of this city, next year.

The Clan-na-gael association of this city will celebrate the sixteenth anniversary of the execution of the Manchester martyrs—Allen, Larkin, and O'Brien—next Friday.

Martha Green, colored, living on Pomeroy street, was taken with a fit while engaged in cooking, and, falling on the stove, was burned so severely that she died soon afterward.

The beautiful gold medal at the Author's contest was awarded to Sara W. Joyce, of Co. H, Capital City Guards, he receiving more votes than all the other contestants combined.

Miss Frances E. Willard, president National Woman's Christian Temperance union, formerly dean of the Women's college, Evansville, Ill., will speak in the Calvary Baptist church, Thanksgiving evening.

A party of the Washington Monument society, consisting of Hon. Horatio King, Dr. J. M. Toner, Mr. Harkness, Judge Cox, and Dr. Clark, ascended the monument yesterday, accompanied by Justice Drake and Col. Casey. They were gratified at the progress of the work and charmed with the magnificent view.

Mr. John W. Bell, of Montgomery, Md., who was well known in this city, died on Monday night at Mt. Hope retreat, near Baltimore, where he had been for a few months, having lost his reason from a disease of the kidneys. His funeral will take place from the Episcopal church at Belvidere this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

A mission will commence in the chapel at the Soldiers home this evening, and will continue until Sunday under the direction of Father Daly, who has conducted the mission at St. Dominick's church which has just departed. Father Lilly and Lanham, who were associated in that mission, have returned to their homes in Ohio.

The seventeenth annual session of the Patrons of Husbandry (National grange) will begin in this city to-day at Masonic hall. It is expected that about fifty members, representing all the states in the union, will be present and take part in the deliberations. Among those now in this city is Gov. Robey, of Maine, who will represent that state.

THE COMMISSIONERS.

Current Transactions at the Various District Offices.

Washington Johnson has been notified by the commissioners in relation to his action against the district for damage sustained in losing his horse by falling into the sewer in square 665, that they conclude the district is not responsible, and cannot allow his claim.

Preparations are being made by Chief Cronin for the parade of the fire department on Thanksgiving day. The marine band has been engaged.

In answer to a communication from Secretary of War Lincoln, for permission to occupy Seventeenth street with building materials for the new state department building, the commissioners state that according to the building regulations only a foot of street can be occupied and not within three feet of the car track. The commissioners have granted the privilege under these restrictions.

Mr. F. M. Smithson has addressed the commissioners protesting against the interference of the police in requiring him to remove his fruit stand, on the corner of Seventh street and Pennsylvania avenue, adjoining Bacon's store.

Collector Cook states that the taxpayers are coming up promptly with their taxes. The amount of receipts on Monday was \$22,747.23.

William H. Balceok and others have asked the commissioners to extend the sidewalk on B street, from Eleventh street southeast to further west.

In reference to the difficulty between the commissioners and Marshal McMichael, as to the payment of certain fees, the commissioners have decided that as the service for which these fees are charged was not performed by the marshal, but by members of the police force, they see no reason why the service should be paid for twice. And as the amount claimed is greater than the amount appropriated for such service they cannot pay all, and do not care to go to congress for a deficiency for that which they do not think they ought to pay. The service was constructive, and the commissioners have notified the marshal that they would prefer a judicial decision upon the subject.
