 Events of Yesterday.  
 Citizens want a hydrant in square 633.  
 A long line of taxpayers besieged the city  
 collector's office yesterday.  
 The condition of house No. 52 H street  
 northeast has been complained of.  
 The Y. M. C. A. will build a one story  
 gymnasium at 1409 New York avenue to cost  
 \$5,000.  
 John S. Anderson, a veteran of the war of  
 1812, died yesterday at his son's residence, in  
 Anacostia.  
 Ed. St. John and Patrick Ward have been  
 appointed special policemen for duty at the  
 Riggs house.  
 Jerry Matthews was sentenced to jail for  
 ninety days yesterday in the police court for  
 shooting Molly Banks.  
 In the police court yesterday William  
 Montgomery was fined \$5 for driving over  
 a old gentleman named Lewis.  
 The commissioners have refused to allow  
 an entertainment to be given at Wayland  
 in account of the disorder there.  
 The curved gray stone wall fronting the  
 west in steps leading to the capitol has  
 been completed. This wall is included in  
 the proposed grand stairway plan.  
 A number of dog cases were disposed of in  
 the police court yesterday. Judge Spill  
 laid it down as a rule that the owners of  
 premises who dogs stay, whether the latter  
 are owned or not, are responsible for them.  
 The case of Patrick Hasset against the  
 Baltimore and Ohio railway for damages for  
 the loss of his leg, occupied Judge MacArthur  
 the entire day yesterday in the circuit court.  
 The damages claimed are \$30,000. The trial  
 was not concluded yesterday, but goes over till  
 Friday.  
 There will be no changes in the office hours  
 of the city postoffice to-day. The first delivery

**CONTEMPT OF COURT.**

**Cook and Cahill Catch the Censure of  
 Judge Wylie.**  
 Quite an exciting scene took place yester-  
 day morning in the criminal court room dur-  
 ing the progress of the trial of James D.  
 Donnelly, charged with keeping an unlicen-  
 sed bar. Mr. Daniel Cahill, for the de-  
 fendant, asked a postponement for the reason  
 that Col. William A. Cook, the senior counsel  
 in the case, was unwell, and could not attend.  
 The court refused the request, and in a few  
 moments Col. Cook came into court. During  
 Mr. Cahill's opening address to the jury he  
 took occasion to speak of the responsibility of  
 the defendant, and that his father before him  
 had kept the same place of business for up-  
 ward of ten years, and that this case savored  
 more of a persecution than of a just prosecu-  
 tion. He then went on to add that it was  
 commenced and kept up through the efforts  
 of a man who was the president of a bank  
 and of a railway, and of what was called a  
 "citizens' committee." Judge Wylie here in-  
 terrupted him, saying: "This thing has gone  
 far enough, and I will stop  
 you right here." At this point Col.  
 Cook rising from his seat, commenced "Your  
 honor, "I will not hear your either," quickly  
 said the court, "Take your seat, sir." Col.  
 Cook continuing, said, "I only wish to sub-  
 mit to your honor a proposition of law." "I  
 will not hear you, sir," said the judge, appar-  
 ently at a white heat. "Is it proper," con-  
 tinued the colonel, who was still standing  
 "that an attorney should be thus set down  
 upon?" Judge Wylie here, calling excitedly  
 for the marshal, said "Place this man under  
 arrest." The court then gave \$50, sir. You  
 are to stand committed until the fine is paid."  
 The deputy marshal here took Col. Cook  
 from the court room to the marshal's office.  
 In the meantime Mr. Cahill had given his  
 check for the amount, and the court ordered  
 Col. Cook's release. The latter sent word in  
 that he did not wish to be released in that  
 manner. Judge Wylie said he would take  
 no further action in the matter. After a  
 short interval Col. Cook returned, and occu-  
 pied his place at the attorney's desk, but  
 thereafter took no active part in the case.  
 The trial then proceeded. The fact was de-  
 veloped that the commissioners had accepted  
 a deposit from the defendant when he made  
 the application for his license, he to have the  
 privilege of selling until his application  
 should be acted on. Judge Wylie expressed  
 his disapproval of such a practice. The jury  
 returned a verdict of not guilty.
