THE BREVITY BASKET. Filled With Brief Mentions of Many Minor Events of Yesterday. The Arlington Fire Insurance company on Saturday elected the following board of directors: Walter S. Cox, William King, William R. Riley, William Galt, Dr. W. W. Johnson, D. J. Robinson, S. Thomas Brown, Dr. J. W. H. Lovejoy, and Charles Edmonston. The motion for a new trial in the case of William Sweeney and John Herrierty, convicted of highway robbery on John Kausen, came up in the criminal court on Saturday. The motion was refused as to Sweeney, and he was sentenced to five years in the Albany penitentiary. A new trial was granted to Herrierty. The commissioners have ordered that on and after March 1, 1884, the time indicated by bells rung at the several school, fire, or other buildings belonging to the district shall be that of the seventy-fifth standard meridian, which time shall also be the standard governing hours in the various departments of the district government. The case of Francis K. Callahan, convicted of violating the postal laws by taking money from letters, was called in the criminal court on Saturday, and he was sentenced to one year in the Albany penitentiary. Callahan said that liquor was the cause of his crime. Judge Wylie remarked that half of the crime committed was caused by liquor. The greenback labor convention has issued the following call: "A national convention of the national greenback labor party to nominate candidates for president and vice president of the United States, to be voted on at the coming presidential election, will be held in the city of Indianapolis, Ind., on Wednesday, the twenty-eighth of May, 1884." A fire occurred in Entwistle's engraving establishment, on Louisiana avenue, Saturday night about 10 o'clock. The lower portion of the building was occupied by Mr. J. W. Davis with a stock of fancy writing paper, ball programmes, &c., which was considerably damaged by water. The loss will be about \$5,000 to both. About 10 o'clock the same night the alarm from box 125 was occasioned by the roof of the boiler room of Pettit & Drupp's foundry, Fourteenth and B streets, lighting from sparks from the chimney. Tom Worthington, well known about Washington during the past few years, died at 2 p. m. Saturday morning of general debility, in his 70th year, at No. 1907 E street. He was the first governor of Ohio. He graduated in 1827 from the West Point academy. In 1839 he became general of the second brigade, second division, Ohio militia. He served during the Mexican war and the late "unpleasantness between the states." In February, 1852, he took the field in command of the 56th Ohio volunteers, which regiment he organized at Worthington, Franklin county, Ohio. In August of 1852 he was dismissed the service on charges of "conduct unbecoming an officer and gentleman." In 1851 Congress placed him on the pension roll. He was never married. His relatives live in Ohio. Last night the remains were sent to Chillicothe for interment. The arrangements for the disposition of the body were placed in the hands of Gen. Rosecrans, in behalf of the Army of the Cumberland, and Commissioner Butterworth. Col. Worthington always insisted that his dismissal was on fabricated charges, and he was wont to talk about the matter with fiery indignation. The last will of the late Edward Simms was filed on Saturday. He directs that his daughters, Catharine Virginia and Mary Georgiana, and son Richard E. shall occupy, possess, and live in his residence, 319 C street northwest, for one year after his death. For the maintenance of his son, Richard E. Simms, he bequeaths \$15,000 to his daughter Catharine V., in trust, and after the death of the son this amount and its increase are to be distributed as follows: \$2,000 to St. Vincent's orphan asylum, \$500 to St. Joseph's, and \$500 to St. Ann's, and what may be left to the three daughters. To his grandsons, Edward P. and Harry Simms, of Brooklyn, N. Y., is left \$4,000 each. The residue of the estate is left to the daughters, charging against the share of Mrs. Warren \$5,000 without interest, an amount advanced to her. He names his daughter Catharine V. Simms and son in law W. J. Warren as executors. Zell Hoover Held for Court. The case against Zell Hoover, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, was called in the police court Saturday morning. Senator J. P. Miller, of California, testified that he did not know the defendant, and had never requested any one to get him a page. Mrs. Sampson, mother of the boy, testified to Hoover coming to her house and representing himself as a United States collector, saying he had been instructed by Senator Miller to get him a page. He then obtained \$4.25 to "draw up the necessary papers." The father of the boy testified to going to Senator Miller's and lending Hoover the money, but did not see Senator Miller. The defendant denied ever having said anything about getting the boy a position, but Judge Small held him in \$1,000 bail for the grand jury. Mr. Samuel Hoover went securely for him.
