THE BREVITY BASKET.

Filled With Brief Mention of Many Minor Events of Yesterday.

Dorsey White was fined \$5 in the police court yesterday for beating his wife Maria.

Lewis Auerbach, of 623 Pennsylvania avenue, reports that a Derby hat was stolen from his place Saturday.

William Norris, of 475 Maryland avenue, reports that he had an overcoat stolen from the National theater Saturday night.

Judgment was given in the court of claims yesterday in favor of George T. Deering for \$404 against the District of Columbia.

At the last meeting of St. Patrick's Temperance society Mr. Waters presided. Addresses were made by Mr. Francis McEneraney, and Messrs. Saxton and Wall. Master Skivington gave a recitation.

A colored cart driver named Henry Lomax was committed for one month in default of \$10 for cruelly beating a horse in Judiciary square while the cart was loaded with bricks just to see him jump. He used a big whip.

The application of Mr. William F. Henry for appointment as a special policeman, accompanied by the endorsements of a number of prominent business men of Capitol Hill, was approved by the commissioners yesterday.

A petition from Mr. D. A. Brooks, jr., president of the town council of Casperville, Ky., has been received by the commissioners asking for aid from citizens of Washington in consequence of the floods in that town and the suffering caused from residences being washed away and means of support destroyed.

The Washington monument commission have recently given permission to the Brush-Swan Electric Light company to place ten electric lights on the top of the monument for a period of two weeks. It is stipulated that the lights are to be removed by the first of April. The exhibition will commence probably on Saturday night.

William Noe, superintendent of the water-works extension, gave \$500 bail yesterday for his appearance in court on the twenty-fifth instant. Thomas Iretton, the foreman, has not yet offered bail. These cases grow out of a warrant for manslaughter sworn to by Mrs. Lavinia Brown, wife of Thomas Brown, colored, lately killed in the shaft of the tunnel.

At the last meeting of the directors of the Garfield Memorial hospital the following medical staff was elected: Consulting surgeons, Drs. John Frederick May and Nathan S. Lincoln; consulting physicians, Drs. A. Y. P. Garrett, W. W. Johnston, and J. Taber Johnson; attending surgeons, Dr. J. W. Thompson; attending physicians, Dr. J. W. H. Lovejoy and C. E. Hagner; oculist and aurist, Dr. Swan M. Burnett; house physician, Dr. Henry M. Curtis.

At the meeting yesterday of the directors of the night lodging house it was reported that up to May 15, 1883, when the house closed for the year, the beneficiaries of the organization amounted to 39,098, and from Dec. 29, when the house was again opened, until the close of January, 1884, and for the month of February, 1884, making a grand total of 31,235, being an average of 3,000 persons cared for during each year; and that over 55,000 meals had been supplied—all without charge. A committee consisting of Messrs. McGuire, Lemon, Fitch, and Fisher was appointed to arrange for an entertainment at an early day.

Praying by the Month.

In accordance with the recommendations of the attorney general, Mrs. Russell has been appointed matron of the United States jail in this city. She entered upon the performance of her duties yesterday. The hours of duty will be from morning to evening, and the matron will receive \$85 per month. No additional appropriation will be needed to pay Mrs. Russell's salary, as a sufficient amount will be deducted monthly from the salary of the deputy warden and each of the guards. The officials are remonstrating against the deduction in their stipend, because, as one of them said last evening, "all she has to do is to pray with the prisoners and preach to them."

The Garfield Church Organ.

The new organ for the Christian Memorial church, on Vermont avenue, northwest, arrived yesterday. It was purchased from Messrs. Hook & Hastings, of Boston, manufacturers, and cost \$2,000. It has two sets of keys, sixteen stops, and 467 pipes. The wood work is ash and is painted in colors to correspond with the decorations of the church. It is being erected at the left of the pulpit by Mr. Wood, who is employed by the manufacturers.
