**Filled With Brief Mention of Many Minor Events of Yesterday.**  
 Nearly \$400 has been subscribed within the past ten days toward the coming league meet of the Washington cycle club.  
 Albert Geston, a bogus water inspector, was sentenced on Saturday, in the police court, to ninety days in the workhouse.  
 William Hornback, of No. 230 C street, had stolen Saturday, from a new building upon which he was at work, two iron planes.  
 Charles E. Harper has been appointed by the commissioners as a private in the fire department vice James T. Norris, resigned.  
 Thomas Money and Michael Money and Joseph Powell were fined \$5 each in the police court Saturday for assaulting Hezekiah McPherson, a private watchman, with clubs and stones.  
 Ludwig Ringlar fell on the pavement at the corner of Seventh and G streets Saturday morning while suffering from hemorrhaging of the lungs. He was removed to Providence hospital.  
 Saturday night Mr. Charles E. Rice, of No. 908 M street, had stolen from the Russian bath rooms a gold open-face watch and linked chain and locket; also a gold ring, with the monogram "C. E. R." A card case and \$2.75 in money was also taken.  
 Mrs. Delafeld, of No. 1715 I street, has notified the police that she has found her \$25 worth of diamonds that she supposed she had been robbed of last June. A colored girl was arrested on suspicion of having committed the theft, but was afterward released.
