A Busy Day With the Ministers and Elders of That Denomination.

Full Report of the Proceedings of the Meeting Yesterday.

Statistical Reports from All the Churches, Showing a Gratifying Increase.

Strong Action of the Presbytery Upon the Divorce Law and the Use of Tobacco.

The Washington presbytery reassembled at the Sixth Street church, Sixth and C streets southwest, with Rev. Dr. Thomas R. Childs, moderator, in the chair, Rev. G. B. Bittinger, stated clerk, and Joseph Sterling, assistant clerk.

The meeting was opened with devotional exercises, conducted by Rev. Dr. Nourse. The roll was called. The minutes of the meeting on Tuesday night were read and corrected as the request of Rev. Mr. Burghardt by adding the standing committee on Temperance Reports at the last meeting of the presbytery and omitted from the record.

The report of the committee on ministerial relief, submitted a report recommending the renewal of an appropriation to the board of ministerial relief, adopted.

Rev. Mr. Bartlett, chairman of the committee on the Manassas church records, submitted a report recommending a revision and correction of the records. Adopted.

Rev. Messrs. Esby, Nourse, and J. M. Nourse were excused on account of having clerical engagements.

The sessional reports from the Westminster church and the church at Alexandria were submitted and approved.

Rev. Mr. Cobb presented an overture which at a former meeting of the presbytery had been referred to be sent up to the general assembly, which convenes at Saratoga Springs May 15, 1884, relative to the right of a minister to perform the marriage ceremony on persons divorced upon any other ground than that of adultery.

Rev. Dr. Sunderland submitted the report on the sessional record of the New York Avenue church, which was approved. Dr. Sunderland also asked for instructions in regard to certain portions of the record as to suspensions, and the whole matter was, after debate, recommended to the committee on sessional records.

In this connection, Rev. Dr. Sunderland spoke of the divorce question, which had for some time agitated the church, and other remarks, in which sentiments of utter abhorrence of divorce were expressed by Revs. J. E. Nourse, Bartlett, Cobb, and others were made.

The overture of Rev. Mr. Cobb again coming up it was on motion of Rev. Van Dorn referred to a special committee appointed by the moderator, viz, Revs. Chester, Littleton, and Randall.

Rev. Dr. Corson, of the Westchester, Pa., church, was invited to a seat as a corresponding member of the presbytery.

Reports on the sessional records of the Clifton, First, Fourth, Sixth, Fifteenth, Westminster, Western, Big Oak, Albright, Falls, and other churches were submitted and approved.

The clerical delegates appointed to the general assembly were Revs. Craighond, Burghardt, and Bartlett; alternates, Revs. J. E. Nourse and French. Upon the part of the laity, Elders Esby, French, J. W. Merriweather; alternates, Charles B. Barlow and Octavius Knight.

The hour of 12:30 having arrived, the presbytery took a recess until 2:30 p. m. The session was served by the ladies in the basement.

The presbytery reassembled at 2:30 p. m. Elder George C. Harous offered a resolution, which was adopted, that at the ordination and installation of Rev. Mr. Patrick as pastor of the Sixth Street church, on Wednesday evening, April 23, the sermon be preached by Rev. Joseph Kelly, the charge to the people by Rev. Byron Sunderland, and the charge to the pastor by Rev. Dr. Bartlett.

Rev. Mr. Chester, in submitting the statistics of the Metropolitan church, referred to the largely attended night services and the work which is done in the church for the improvement of the condition of the poor in the district.

The reports as a whole showed a decided increase in the spiritual and financial condition of the churches, in addition to membership, especially, and subscriptions to the home and foreign missions.

Rev. G. W. Patch, in submitting the report of the Unity congregation, now worshipping in Clabaugh hall, at 1530 Fourteenth street northwest, reported that the sum of \$5,500 had been raised for the purpose of the erection of a church at the corner of R and Fourteenth streets.

Rev. Mr. Henry (colored), in submitting the statistical report of the Albright church—Virginia, said that everything connected with it was "all right and all bright," and the brightest thing about his report was the great temperance sentiment that prevails in that locality. He asked assistance for the erection of a public school at Albright.

Rev. Dr. Craighond, in submitting the report of Howard university, took occasion to refer to the success of the university and the students who have graduated from that institution and become stationed in several parts of the country.

A Friend of "Print" Matthews Tells Plain Truths Concerning Bourbon Intolerance.

The Only Hope of Southern Republicans is in Their Northern Brothers.

JACKSON, TENN., April 3.—In these days of the suppression of free speech and free thought, when a man is not allowed to vote to the polls and vote without perilling his life he votes in opposition to bourbon democracy in the south, we of this section must look to the northern press for a fair, unvarnished detail of the doings in our own midst. Hence I write to give some of the unwritten and hitherto unpublished facts in connection with the cowardly and brutal assassination of J. Matthews in Harlehurst last November.
