IN THREE ROUNDS.

Another Brutal Slugging Match Interrupted by the Police.

A spirited glove fight took place on the Theater Comique stage Saturday night between George W. Phillips and Sam Johnson, both colored. The contest was to determine the championship of the district. After three rounds had been fought Phillips was declared winner and the champion of Washington. The battle was witnessed by a full audience, including many local "sportsmen." During the rounds the spirits of the gallery indulged in sundry exclamations, such as "Slug him behind the ear, Johnson!" "Now's your time, Phillips!" "Was him under the jaw!" "Bang him lively!" etc. Besides such remarks as these and a few drunken yells from below, no disorder occurred.

Phillips, the winner, is a larger man than Johnson and of a darker hue. He is very muscular and "scientific." His friends claim that he has fought twelve battles and won every one of them.

Johnson is rather short and of a copper color. His frame is well knit and muscular. He has fought several battles, including one with Kelly a few weeks ago. In the latter he was knocked several times.

The first round of Saturday's fight opened with considerable leg gymnastics and long-range sparring. Johnson got in the first round a sledge hammer blow, which caused him to stagger. He had fully recovered Phillips was on him again and struck the little man a series of blows which sent him behind the scenes like a cannon ball.

The third round was opened by Johnson, who landed a blow on Phillips after the fashion of a little bantam rooster fighting a large bird. Phillips powerful blows had apparently taught him wisdom, and he was very shy. Finally Phillips forced the fighting by closing. The result was that Johnson was "downed" several times and in a dazed condition. Johnson managed to get in one or two light face blows. The round ended by Phillips knocking Johnson behind the wings. The referee then came forward and motioned the Phillips to a dazed condition. There is some talk of Phillips challenging Kelly, the lightweight champion of New York city.
