John H. Reeves, a colored employe of the general land office, has been missing for a week. It is supposed that he has wandered away because of insanity.

The following persons will be arraigned in the criminal court to-day: John D. Chollar and Edwin C. Mason, grand larceny; Louis Karcher, killing of John W. Grimes March 27 last.

The body of Hothe-Mute, the Indian delegate from the Seminoles nation, has been removed from the Congressional cemetery, embalmed, and will be forwarded to Muscogee, Indian territory, by express.

The trial of Sonny A. Webb, charged with perjury, was resumed yesterday in the criminal court. After hearing the testimony of R. T. Burley, Sonny A. Webb, N. A. Johnson, and Charles R. Vernon, the arguments were commenced, and about 3 o'clock the case was continued until to-day.

He prays that the said defendants be restrained and enjoined from further prosecuting their suit at law against him, and that all proper accounts be taken in the case.
