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HANGING WORK.

"BUG" CEPHAS AND ALEXANDER JEFFERSON SUFFER THE DEATH PENALTY.

Bludge Work at Both Executions—The Bludge Turned Off and the Horrible Contortions of Their Features Exposed to Three Men Hung for Arson.

CAMBRIDGE, Mo., Aug. 1.—Frederick, alias "Bug," Cephas, colored, who was hanged to-day for the murder of Mrs. Celia Bush Murphy, on the 7th of April last, spent a quiet night, sleeping soundly from 9 o'clock until 5 o'clock this morning, after which he was clothed with his spiritual advisers.

At 12:10 p. m. Cephas was led from his cell to the scaffold, passing in view of 300 people. He ascended to the scaffold singing "Jesus, Lover of My Soul," and was accompanied by the clergyman throughout.

He made a few remarks, confessing the crime, and saying he regretted it. He then turned his back to the gallows, and the executioner stepped forward to his attendants, and professed his readiness to die. When the sheriff cut the rope Cephas, not having been securely fastened on the scaffold, fell backward, and the scene was sickening. Death resulted in a few minutes from strangulation.

It is not to be rebuilt on new piers, with wide spans, as water behind the piers will create a high rate of speed in smooth water, and will ruin the piers. It is proposed to build a new bridge with wide spans, and to remove the old bridge.
