yesterday.

The filthy condition of the alley be-
tween Sixth and Seventh streets, and I
street and Massachusetts avenue has been
complained of by citizens.

Mr. G. H. Mitchell invites amateur
singers wishing to form a double quartette
to meet him at No. 1802 Sixteenth street
northwest Monday evening.

In reply to a complaint the commis-
sioners have informed J. C. Glick that as
far as is known there is no intention of
the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad com-
pany to lay additional tracks on First
street.

In the police court yesterday Charles
Lindner, alias Lancaster, a broiler, a man
who murdered Officer Fowler, was ar-
raigned for assaulting Mrs. McCormick.
The latter failed to identify him as her
assailant and he was discharged.

In reply to a complaint the commis-
sioners have notified Maj. Dye to have
the police keep an eye upon the dumping
ground at Thirtieth and E streets south-
west, to see that nothing is deposited there
that will create a nuisance.

Detectives Cox and Carter yesterday
arrested William Parker, a colored man,
for stealing \$3.40 from Mrs. Mattie E. Car-
ter, of 1311 street. Mrs. Burke gave Car-
ter a \$10 bill in payment for some
washing, but Carter only returned her
change for \$1, refusing to give the rest.

incorporation of the National Mutual
Aid society. The object is to support and
assist its members in case of disability
from sickness or accident, burying the
dead, and payment of endowments.

A BLUFF BET AND A FIGHT.
Charles P. Nye Secures the Stakes,
but Gets a Pounding for His Shrewd-
ness.

"I'll bet you \$10 you can't show me \$15
in three minutes," said the proprietor of
a saloon on H street, to Charles P. Nye,
an insurance agent, Thursday night.
The bet was accepted, and the two men
held the stakes. The proprietor put up
his \$10 and left the room, returning in
the specified time. In the meantime Nye
secured the stakes, claiming to have
shown \$15. When the proprietor re-
turned he claimed that Nye had not
shown his money and had lost. Nye left
the saloon and was arrested by the prop-
rietor and a man named Quill, and
taken to police headquarters, where he
was charged with the larceny of \$10. He
left \$25 collateral, and the case was dis-
missed in the police court yesterday. Nye
subsequently swore out warrants against
the proprietor and Quill for assault and
battery.

court, and a rule was served for him to
show cause why he should not be pun-
ished for contempt, but no further steps

min of the court.

NOT READY FOR ELECTRICITY.
The Commissioners Decline Street
Lighting Can Only be Done by
Underground Wires.

The commissioners yesterday sent a
letter to the manager of the Brush-Swan
Electric Light company, stating that they
have decided that they cannot properly
make any award for the electric lighting of
Pennsylvania avenue, or any of the propo-
sals submitted by the company.

The commissioners also sent the fol-
lowing letter to the manager of the
United States company: "The purpose of
the commissioners' letter of the 20th
ultimo was to obtain specific propositions
for electric lighting on the avenue, sub-
ject to certain general conditions, which
were distinctly laid down, one of which
was especially noted as 'imperative.' The
proposition contained in your letter is
in no manner subject to these conditions,
and, therefore, cannot be regarded as a
proposal such as was solicited, nor can it
fairly be compared with any other propo-
sals submitted under the conditions in-
volved. Your proposition contemplates a
trial period; but experience has demon-
strated to the commissioners the impor-
tance of insisting on this as a safeguard
against the permanent establishment of a
system that may turn out to be an ob-
jectionable one. Again, you ask that the
commissioners modify what they have
designated as the imperative requirement,
viz that in any permanent system of
electric lighting the wires shall all be
placed underground at once; they believe
the underground system is perfectly feasi-
ble; but if they are mistaken on this point,
it is their emphatic opinion that the time
for the electric lighting of this city has
not yet come. It can hardly be doubted
that, in the minds of most citizens, the
grave objections to an extensive system
of overhead electric light wires will out-
weigh all advantages that may follow the
introduction of this light as a substitute
for gas. For these reasons the commis-
sioners are compelled to decline your
proposition."
