Citizens want Champlain avenue, between Boundary street and Columbia road, graded. William Green was robbed of \$35 while in a house on Thirteenth-and-a-half street Sunday night.

A number of tramps were sent to the workhouse by Judge Snell yesterday to fill the chain gang. W. E. Vogelsson and Charles W. Swingle, substitute letter carriers, have been promoted to the regular force.

An unknown lady was slightly injured yesterday by being struck by debris from the old Moses building, which is being torn down.

The register received yesterday the will of the late Elizabeth Tate for probate and record. The testatrix leaves her estate to her children.

The number number of the First Call, the army paper, edited by Private Dietrich, 2d United States artillery, and published at the arsenal here, will be issued, next Tuesday.

Charles Nelson, the man who shot two women in Willow street late Thursday night, as stated in THE REPUBLICAN yesterday, was held in \$1,000 for trial by Judge Snell yesterday.

President Arthur and the members of the Washington Monument commission intended to visit the monument yesterday to go to the top of the shaft, but the threatening weather of the morning deferred the visit, and the President determined to postpone the matter until after his return from New York, in a week or ten days.

The Central and Second National banks, by their attorneys, Messrs. Edwards & Barnard and William F. Mattingly, have filed a bill in equity against Ellen C. Wright, widow, and Roguard Kendall, co-defendant, to set aside an insurance policy on the life of the late G. M. Wright to the payment of an indebtedness to the Central National bank of \$3,000.85 and the Second National of \$3,749.00.

Justice Cox yesterday in his equity court in the case of Eugene M. Kitzwitz against Edward Abner, involving the possession of Blackiston island, passed a decree denying the injunction, dissolving the partnership, and referring the matter to the attorney at account. Mr. Abner is required to give bond in the sum of \$3,000 to protect the partnership property, otherwise the injunction will be enforced.

The commissioners have decided to grant the United States Electric Light company permission to lay underground conduits on F street, from Ninth to Fifteenth streets, but they will not grant any permit that gives exclusive rights for an underground electric system to any company, or that does not limit the period in which the work proposed shall be finished.

MRS. WOOD'S HARD FATE. Evidence That Her Husband Struck a Grave Robber to Retain Her.

Mrs. Elizabeth Wood, with her application to set aside the decree of divorce granted her husband, Foster P. Wood, files an affidavit made by Maud A. C. L. Brenaby, who states that in March last she met Jansen, alias Valarmar, with whom Mrs. Wood is charged to have committed adultery, and he asked her to tell Mrs. Wood that he wanted to see her on business, but not to tell her his right name.

He said: "She wants a place under the government, and I may get her one." When the affiant asked some questions Jansen replied: "I have a little game by which I can make considerable money, and I want you to mind your own business and introduce me to her." He promised if the affiant would give the introduction he would purchase for her a pair of gaiters to cost \$3, which he has not yet done.

On the 4th of April he came to the affiant's house and said: "I have now got my money from the parties who hired me to put this thing through, and Mrs. Wood will soon have a place." She says that Mrs. Wood having expressed a desire to see employment, that at various times she went to his house, and in the evening Jansen called and was introduced. She remained only a short time and went home, leaving Mrs. Wood with her two daughters and Jansen together. She knew no more about the matter until the discovery of Mrs. Wood and Jansen in Alexandria. She went at once to see Jansen, and said to him: "I believe you have been hired to do this." He replied in a laughing manner: "You have guessed it, and I was afraid you would find it out before the thing came off. He added that Jansen had not much money, but a detective who was intimate with one of Wood's daughters had furnished the money.
