

THE SENATE UNCHANGED. VERY LITTLE NEW CAN BE SAID REGARDING THE OHIO LEGISLATURE.

FORAKER'S EXPLANATION. What He Regards as the Leading Motives Which Led to the Victory in Ohio.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 15.—Judge Foraker governor-elect, being asked what he regarded as the leading motives that led to the result in Ohio, said: "The Republicans regarded it important that the decision should be made at the first election after the beginning of a Democratic administration."
