BULGARIANS RECAPTURE BRENKIN AND DISPENSE THE SERVIANS.

"Metz and Elsass-Lothringen"—The Queen's Proclamation—Germany Acquiesces in the Pope's Decision—Russian Mobilization—Kidnaped by Brigands.

Sofia, Nov. 18.—A telegram received here states that Bulgarian troops have recaptured Brenkin and dispersed the Servians. No fears are entertained at present for the safety of Sofia.

Vienna, Nov. 18.—The New Freie Presse has a report that Prince Alexander has been released.

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The Daily News has a dispatch from Sofia confirming the report of a Bulgarian victory. The Servians lost ten guns and 1200 men. It is estimated that 3,000 Servians were killed or wounded.

The Daily Telegraph says: It is almost certain that Greece will go to war. A captain of the Greek army has been arrested in London to purchase a man-of-war.

It is reported that Turkish troops will occupy Romania to-morrow, the Porte expecting the assistance of the powers to accompany them.
