ANOTHER INTERESTING DEBATE UPON THE TARIFF QUESTION.

Speeches by Senators Dawes, McPherson, and Beck—A Contest for Precedence—Numerous New Measures Introduced in the House.

In the Senate yesterday, after the transaction of routine business, Mr. Morgan called up his resolution of Dec. 9 requesting the Secretary of the Interior to furnish information as to the state of facts on which the coal and iron mines of Alabama have been withheld from sale notwithstanding the act of March 3, 1885.

Mr. Cullom made an effort to have the special order on Mr. Logan's bill (accepting land for government purposes on Lake Michigan) postponed until to-morrow, but Mr. Platt insisted that the special order be for open executive sessions took precedence of this.

The Senate then, at 12:30, resumed consideration of Mr. Morrill's resolution declaring the promise of making a proper revision of the tariff at the present session objectionable and impracticable.

Mr. Dawes proceeded to address the Senate on that subject.

It had always been the policy, he said, of the tariff commission to make the revenue exceed the expenditures of the government, to make efforts, by the reduction of customs duties and internal taxes, to bring the revenue to a point where it would be about equal to the expenditures.

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DELIBERATE MURDER.

Admitted to Have Been Planned by Baltimore Body-Snatchers.

BALTIMORE, Md., Dec. 13.—A coroner's jury today investigated the death of Zealy Brown, who was carried to the Maryland Penitentiary on Friday night and sold for use in the dissecting room. The evidence adduced and the admissions made by the men under trial were reported to the jury.
