PRESIDENTIAL VETO.

The Bill for Distribution of Seeds to Drought-Stricken Counties of Texas. In the message to the House yesterday announcing the veto of the bill appropriating \$10,000 to enable the commissioner of agriculture to make a special distribution of seeds in the drought-stricken counties of Texas, the President said:

I feel obliged to withhold my approval of the plan as proposed by this bill, to indulge a benevolent and patriotic impulse through the appropriation of public funds for that purpose.

I can find no warrant for such an appropriation in the Constitution, and I do not believe that the Government is authorized to make such a distribution of public funds.
