

SALISBURY COERCION.

HE DEFENDS THE BILL AS A NECESSITY—IT IS NOT UNJUST.

Mr. Gladstone's Repudiation of the Bill—Coercion as Applied to the Bill—Tries to Make Capital at the Expense of Gladstone's Record.

LONDON, Apr. 20.—Lord Salisbury, in an address delivered last night before the Primrose League at Albert Palace, the occasion being the sixth anniversary of the death of the Earl of Beaconsfield, said the hollow agitation carried on during the Easter holidays by the opposition had failed, and that the government's course was the country's.

THE IRISH IN ENGLAND. LONDON, Apr. 20.—An Irish non-commissioned officer of artillery at Woolwich arsenal has been degraded and dismissed without trial on a charge of having sold secrets of the office. A civilian accomplice has also been dismissed.

CONFIRMATIONS SENTENCED TO DEATH. ST. PETERSBURG, Apr. 20.—Six of the conspirators against the life of the czar were confirmed to death, and the others to imprisonment for life.
