The duty paid was \$50,955,538, which increased the price of the sugar to consumers just two cents for each pound. The average consumption of sugar in each year in the United States during the last five years, and the direct tax upon every person in the country, rich and poor, old and young, from the infant to the mother's arms to the centenarian tottering on the verge of the grave, was \$19.9 cents. And that too for one of the prime necessities of life. A few large planters in Louisiana made 300,000,000 pounds of sugar and they were the only beneficiaries of this tax. The United States government not only did not need the money, but the Democratic authorities are trying to devise a method to prevent getting so much.
