GENERAL NEWS.

The rental of the Unitarian Church at San Francisco for the present year is \$70,000. This beats Beecher's \$20,000.

A man in New Bedford has very nearly discovered perpetual motion. Nothing seems wanting to complete success but the removal of a "hitch" that appears to prevent the machine from starting on its endless journey—Like the shareholders in the Atlantic cable, the inventor is sanguine that he will accomplish it the next time.

The citizens of St. Paul are excited over discoveries of gold and silver bearing quartz in St. Louis county, Minnesota. Specimens assayed at the Philadelphia mint show a proportion of \$25.63 of gold to \$4.42 of silver.

The Fenians are negotiating for the purchase of eight ocean steamers, and it is stated large quantities of arms have been purchased of the Government by parties in their interest.

About 40,000 bushels of corn and oats have reached Rome, Ga., for distribution among the needy in that section of country. The gift is from the Government, and Capt. Chas. A. Dean, A. Q. D., is charged with its distribution.

Eighty-five colored people, who had no permanent employment in Washington, have been sent to Providence, Rhode Island, by the Bureau, where homes and labor have been provided for them. Female servants are in demand there.

The Post-Office Department has issued a circular, saying the penalties for carrying letters outside the mails will be rigidly enforced. When letters are not enclosed in Government stamped envelopes, carried by other conveyances, they will subject the captain, owner, driver or other employed, to a fine of \$150 for each offense.

The first practical case of punishment in the army for miscegenation is that of Capt. E. G. Scranton. 12th U. S. colored troops, who have been tried by Court Martial on a charge of cohabiting within camp, and afterwards marrying a colored woman of bad reputation, and sentenced to be dismissed the service. The offense was committed in Gen. Gilmore's Department.

Travelers may now go by rail from New York to Columbus, Ga. The trip occupies five days and costs \$66. It is said Mr. Stephens prefers remaining in prison and taking his chances for pardon, to leaving the country never to return. The choice has been tendered to him.

The New York Herald, of the 20th, learns from reliable sources that the Fenian organization in the Northern States numbers 221,000 men, who are pledged to move, any day, in assisting in separating Ireland from Great Britain.

Gov. Curtin, of Pennsylvania, favors a speedy reduction of our armed forces and national expenditures, and the restoration of the rights both of citizens and States under the Union and the constitution.

The New York correspondent of the Boston Post says that services are held every Sunday in Cooper Institute, in the interest of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, with the intention of organizing there an ecclesiastical society, whose head shall be in the South.

We published a few days since a statement to the effect that Brigadier General Draper was shot by accident. It now appears that he was shot and killed on Brazos Island, Texas, it is supposed by some members of the 25th Wisconsin. A number of soldiers of the regiment have been placed under arrest.

A Rochester paper says: "A man who resides in Chili, N. Y., declares that he has discovered the cause of the prevailing drouth. He attributes it to the large number of lightning rods recently put up in this region of country. He says these rods take the electricity from the clouds, and they scatter without affording rain."
