

Veli-Pacha, the new Turkish ambassador in Paris, is only thirty years of age, and is so immensely rich as to be called the Mussulman Rothschild. It is said he spent fifty million francs on his journey from the Sublime Porte to the Barriere de l'Etrole. All his attendants wore, during the whole trip, the Turkish costume. He gave away twenty thousand dollars in gratuities to servants, postillions and chambermaids, from Marseilles to Paris.

A gentleman writing from St. Petersburg, in December, says that "A universal thaw prevails throughout Russia—all the ice is broken up—the weather mild and close—and a deluge of rain falling. In consequence, the sledges in common use at this season are abandoned for carriages, where boats are not required."

The Ericsson air ship is getting ready for her trip South, which will be to Baltimore or Washington. He is said to have executed a will, in which he bequeathed to the eccentric countess a life interest of \$30,000, together with his portfolio of water drawings, and a portrait of himself. There are those who go so far as to say that the former will be the more acceptable legacy.

The House Printing Telegraph Company have succeeded in laying down their wires across the North River, thus giving the means of sending and receiving instantaneous printed messages between New York and Washington.

Balloting for candidates to be recommended for office to Gen. Pierce seems to be adopted in quite a number of places. At Oswego, N. Y. lately, the Democrats balloted for a Collector of the Port.

A great flood has taken place on the northwest branch of the Susquehanna river. Seven bridges were swept away and other damage resulted.

The Michigan Legislature has passed the Main Liquor law, provided with the approval of the people.

The people of Vermont have adopted by a heavy majority a very stringent anti-liquor law. The vote was by ballot.

The Legislature of Rhode Island have passed the anti-liquor law.

CHARTER.

Of the New Orleans, Red River and Texas Telegraph Company and Branches.
WE, the undersigned, agree to form and constitute a corporation under the act of the Legislature of the State of Louisiana, entitled "An Act for the organization of corporations for works of public improvement and utility," passed at the session of the year 1852, for the purpose of constructing and carrying on an Electric or other Telegraph from New Orleans to Shreveport, in the State of Louisiana, and from Opelousas in said State to Galveston in the State of Texas, and from Thibodaux to Plaquemine in Louisiana, viz: A. M. Holbrook, Benj. P. Crane and George May, of New Orleans; H. C. Thibodaux, Joshua Baker, Alex. Mouton, W. W. Pugh, F. A. Richter, A. J. Powell and L. W. Cady, of Louisiana, have agreed upon the following

CHARTER.
ART. 1. This corporation shall be known and designated by the name of "The New Orleans, Red River and Texas Telegraph Co." Its domicile, until otherwise ordered by the incorporators shall be in the city of New Orleans, and all legal process against the corporation shall be served upon the President thereof in person, or by leaving it with any officer or agent of the company in its office in New Orleans.

ART. 2. The purpose of this corporation is the construction and maintaining of a Telegraph of any approved patent from New Orleans, on such routes as may be selected, and connecting the towns of Thibodaux, Franklin, Lafayette, Opelousas, Alexandria, Natchitoches, Sireverport and Donaldsonville, and Plaquemine in Louisiana, and Houston and Galveston in Texas.

ART. 3. The capital stock of the company is fixed at \$150,000, divided into 3000 shares of \$50 each. The payment of subscriptions to the stock shall be made in five installments over each share, and in such manner as the trustees hereinafter named shall determine. The company shall be fully organized when 1500 shares of stock shall have been taken.

ART. 4. The following persons are appointed trustees of the line for the purpose of receiving subscriptions to the stock, and managing the affairs of the company until it is fully organized as provided in the preceding articles, viz: Benj. P. Crane, of New Orleans, and L. W. Cady, of Baton Rouge. Said trustees shall have power to appoint deputies or agents in such places as they may choose, for receiving subscriptions and doing such other acts as they may be authorized to perform.

ART. 5. The affairs of this company, when fully organized, shall be conducted by a president and such officers and directors as the stockholders shall determine at their first meeting. At all elections by the stockholders, and at all their meetings, on all questions submitted to their vote, each share shall be entitled to one vote.

ART. 6. The trustees heretofore named shall have power to do everything necessary for the construction of the Line of Telegraph hereby established, collect all moneys due from subscription to the stock, to disburse the same for said construction, to make all necessary contracts for the purchase of all materials deemed by them necessary for the company.

ART. 7. Annual meetings of this company shall be held at such times and places as may be prescribed by the stockholders at their first meeting, and special meetings may be called by the president whenever in his opinion the interests of the company may require it, or when it may be demanded by persons holding one third of the stock.

New York World's Fair!

TO THE CITIZENS OF Louisiana, Alabama, Mississippi, Texas, Arkansas and Tennessee:
1. The Board of Directors of the New York Crystal Palace having appointed a committee for the Southwestern States, resident at New Orleans, consisting of James Robt. Lunsford, Duncan E. LaSere, W. A. Gasquet, W. N. Mercer, H. H. Hill, A. F. Axson, Manuel White, J. D. Debow, A. M. Holbrook, A. Walker, C. J. Leeds and Newton Richards, the undersigned, upon the part of said committee, would present the following address:

2. The Fair will be opened on the 21st day of May, 1853, for the exhibition of the industry of all nations in the splendid structure on Reservoir Square, New York, embracing an area of 173,000 square feet or four acres. The building has been made a bonded warehouse by Government, and already assurances are given of an extensive representation of foreign industry.

3. The objects of the exhibition cannot be subserved without an equal representation of all the great industrial interests of our own Confederation, whether in raw materials, manufactured products, or in the fine arts. The Fair will be opened to the cereal products of the Northern and Western States, the cotton, sugar and rice of the South; the hemp, tobacco, and other miscellaneous products of the West; the mineral resources of all these regions. It is extremely desirable that these great interests should be represented, as well as the manufacturing, in order that the New and the Old World should be contrasted together, and the two regions mutually improved and instructed.

4. Applications for admission of objects of exhibition must represent their nature and purpose, with the number of square feet required, whether of wall, floor, or counter. The machinery will be exhibited in motion, the motive power to be furnished by the association, and applicants must also state the amount of power required. Paintings in frames will be received. When ones are exhibited, they should be accompanied by the models in which they are found, and also, if possible, by plans and sections of the measures in which they lie, and models and drawings of processes or manufacture.

5. Prizes for excellence to the different departments will be awarded under the direction of capable and eminent persons.

6. Applications from any of the States named in this address may be made at any time before the list of March 1853, and must be directed to the chairman of the committee, at New Orleans, complying with all the requisitions of Section 4, above. The applicant must describe with precision the time the product will be ready for shipment, and the port from which he desires to ship, and must also provide for the expenses incurred upon it in the way of freight, drayage, &c., until delivered into the custody of the New York Board.

7. The committee at New Orleans will decide upon all such applications, and upon the receipt of their favorable judgment the party will be supplied with a certificate, to be forwarded to New York at the time of shipment. They desire to be informed by the list of Marsh of the quantity of space which will be required from their division, in order to report to the Central Committee, and earnestly solicited to be represented in this First Great American Fair.
