Garibaldi's Reception at Genoa.

[Correspondence of the Pall Mall Gazette.]

Genoa, 11.—It was nearly midnight when Garibaldi arrived on shore. Immediately came a tremendous rush, which nearly had the effect of precipitating the general and all around him into the water; but by dint of hard fighting on the part of the few national guards who were left, he passed safely into the custom house. Here a number of gentlemen formed round Garibaldi, flanking their arms about another's bodies, so as to make a strong circle, and in this manner, slowly and with great difficulty, forced a way through the mob which had collected afresh, and greeted their gallant visitor with frantic shouts and equally frantic attempts to get near him. The procession through the street had in its something of the grotesque; in front walked men with flaming torches, and others carrying rouserscript flags; behind these came a confused press of the national guard, next the body guard, close to which marched a fellow with an enormously fat wax candle, who kept dropping hot wax down the neck of one of those devoted band in a way that will cause him to remember the scene, vividly enough for the rest of his life.

Around seethed a dense mass of the excited populace, screaming and pushing in every direction, if only to get a look at their beloved hero. In the midst of all this uproar marched Garibaldi, as calmly as if he had been taking an afternoon promenade in the silence of Cappa, his fine face, slightly flushed and relaxing now and then into a charming smile as some intruder, more vigorous than the rest, pressed closer upon him. Garibaldi looks in most robust health, and so far as I could discern his lameness has entirely disappeared. Indeed, his whole frame seems to be as full, and fresh and vigorous as before he received his unfortunate wound. So well does he appear, that but for his grizzled hair one might easily mistake him for a young man. He was dressed in his usual simple fashion of a red shirt and a hanging petticoat; he also wore a low-crowned black hat. When at last he reached the hotel of the Nations and bowed from the balcony to the people below, their enthusiasm knew no bounds; they screamed "Eviva, Garibaldi," at the top of their voices, and never ceased their cheering, until he took his departure for Milan by the five o'clock train.
