**Edward Everett on Free Masonry.**

We would call the attention of our Free Mason fellow-citizens to the following letter from Edward Everett. We find it in the 44th volume of Niles, Register, page 382, and extract it therefrom. Here it is:

Mr. EDWARD EVERETT.--The subjoined letter was written in answer to inquiries proposed by the anti-Masonic committee of Middlesex county, Massachusetts, through their Secretary, Herman Atwood, Esq., and is interpreted as identifying the political interest of the writer with the cause of anti-masonry:

"Worcester, Mass., June 29, 1833.  
"MY DEAR SIR: I have your favor of the 27th instant, addressed to me, on behalf of the anti-Masonic committee of the county of Middlesex, in which you request an expression of my views and opinions, relative to the institution of secret societies generally.

"My public engagements, as you are probably aware, are of such a nature, as to make it impossible for me to attempt a detailed exposition of my views on this subject during the present week. Nor is this, perhaps, necessary. I notice in your letter that you quote one or two sentences from the letter of Mr. Wirt of the 28th of September, 1831, as containing the principles of the 'large and respectable portion of my fellow-citizens and constituents,' on whose behalf you address me. In the correctness of those principles I fully concur. The supremacy of the laws, is the fundamental principle of civil society. The allegiance due to the country is the highest human obligation of all men who enter into civil society; and I conceive the institution of free masonry to be at war with both these principles.

"With respect to this institution, I came to the conclusion, and expressed it repeatedly in public, several years before the present controversy arose, that its pretensions to antiquity were unfounded. It is probably the growth of the last century and a half. It has frequently been admitted to me by respectable members of the society, that it is useless; and that as such it had better be abolished. Its only avowed objects--charity and knowledge--can be better promoted by public associations. If it be useless, it must be worse than useless; because it occasions a waste of all the time, attention and money--necessary to keep up its organization. The titular and ceremonial parts of it, as displayed before the public, appear to me strangely at variance with good taste, particularly in a republican community.

"But the great objections to such institutions lie much deeper. All secret societies are dangerous in proportion to the extent of their organization and the number of their members. A secret society so widely diffused and connected as this, puts a vast power, capable of the most dangerous abuse, into hands irresponsible to the public. The secret ceremonies and rites, as they have been disclosed, appear to me, on many grounds, highly objectionable; and the oaths and obligations are open to the most weighty exceptions, on the score of religion, morals and good sense. I am aware that some of these oaths must have been taken by many great and good men. This does not alter their character; and, as I cannot believe that they could have stood a day before the face of public sentiment, had they been openly administered and received, it is not the least objection to the institution, that, as a secret society whose rites and ceremonies must be substantially unknown beforehand, great and good men have been surprised into giving it a seeming sanction.

"The force of these objections is immeasurably increased by the fact, that within a few years the institution has the caused greatest (the greatest because irreparable) evil, which can be inflicted on society, the destruction of the life of a citizen, followed up by systematic and successful attempts to screen the murderers, in defiance of the most vigorous efforts, on the part of the tribunals, to bring them to justice.

"It is unnecessary to say that I speak of the tendency of the institution, as evinced in cases that have occurred, and consequently may occur again, and not of a necessary effect in all cases. When

I reflect that Warren and Washington, among the dead, and Marshall among the living, and numbers of pious, virtuous and honorable men, in the community around us (some of whom I have the happiness to count among my personal friends) are members of the institution, I cordially adopt the sentiments of Mr. Wirt in reference to the same point, that, both justice and prudence demand discrimination, and that it would be 'an unjust proscription to involve innocence with guilt and treason.'

"Such are my views on this subject, very justly expressed, which in compliance with your request, you have my permission to make public. I am aware, from some little experience that this may expose me to obloquy; which I would rather avoid. But if a man cannot safely venture on the expression of sentiments like the foregoing, it is idle boast of the liberty of speech and the press.

**Gen. Wm. O. Butler.**  
This 'old warhorse' of the Democracy is in the field. The Louisville Courier gives an account of a great Breckinridge and Lane barbecue in Carroll county, Kentucky. That paper says:

The meeting was opened by a speech from Major-General William O. Butler, formerly a candidate for the Vice Presidency on the ticket with Gen. Cass. He said that this was the first political speech he had made in sixteen years, and that nothing could have drawn him into the canvass but the deep interest he felt in the election of Breckinridge and Lane, and the unalloyed course pursued by Douglas and his friends. The General pitched into Douglas right and left, and he talked very plainly about him and his doctrines. He denounced Squatter Sovereignty, and alluding to it said: 'Are these the views of the statesman? Are these the morals of a gentleman?' He declared solemnly that when he was on the ticket with Cass, in 1848, he never dreamed of countenancing such a doctrine, and he thought the united South should now stand as one man for constitutional equality against such doctrines, the effect of which, if not the main intent, must be the subversion of the rights of the slaveholding States. He denounced the proceedings of the Douglas men in the Convention as the game of 'fast and loose,' 'diddle-rigging,' and denied that Douglas was nominated according to the rules and usages of the Democratic party. It was a glorious sight to behold the ancient Democrat and gallant soldier, with his silver hair streaming in the breeze, his eye untamed, as he dealt his blows vigorously on the heads of those enemies of the country who are now trying to nurse the 'Union Constitutional' party into existence.

**QUEER CUSTOMERS.**--A correspondent of the Charleston Courier, writing from Conwayboro, S. C., says: 'I know an old gentleman aged 73 years, having five sons, and all have families. Not one of them has ever owned one dollar, ever took a drink of spirituous liquors, ever used a cup of coffee, ever used profane language, ever was one hundred miles from home, ever wanted for anything, ever lost his vote in an election; are all Methodist and Breckinridge Democrats, and hate snakes and tobacco.'

**The Millerites have just concluded their annual religious services in North Wilbraham, Mass. The sect, it was stated, now number 50,000 in the United States and Canada, and representatives from nearly every State in the Union attend their annual camp-meetings. Great diversity of opinion exists among them regarding the time when the world is to come to an end. Some anticipate the universal overthrow in sixteen weeks, others look for it previous to the last of March, 1861, while others still are confident that it will be postponed ten years and two weeks.**

**A GOOD JOKE.**--Some joke-loving individuals recently posted the following about the streets of New York:

WANTED, A WET NURSE.--I want to employ a wet nurse for my boy Dug--a round and chubby lad, but entirely incompetent to take care of himself. For some time past he has been alternately taken charge of by Mrs. Richmond and Mrs. Hunt, with an occasional carress by Mrs. Brooks. He is now about passing into the hands of Mrs. Gerrit Smith, who will be his certain death if the arrangement is consummated. These numerous changes of diet have had a deleterious effect upon his bowels, and unless a permanent nurse is procured cannot survive. His nurses, too, have been traveling about with the boy from Main to Georgia, and have permitted him to say many silly things. Previous to the announcement in the papers of his whereabouts, I 'didn't know he was out!'
