**HARD TIMES IN MASSACHUSETTS.**—Some  
of the Republican papers are beginning  
to be compelled to acknowledge the se-  
riously depressing effects of the war on  
Northern manufactures. A correspon-  
dent of the New York World, writes as  
follows from Worcester, Mass.:

In the northern part of this country  
there is no business doing. The great  
pail and chair districts are almost deso-  
lated. The large pail manufactory of the  
Murlocks, in Winchendon, is shut  
up, the proprietors failed, and the work-  
men are out of employment. This is a  
severe blow to the town, but Ashburn-  
ham is in about the same condition.  
One little village in Templeton, of 400  
inhabitants, has lost within three weeks  
over \$100,000, completely ruining the  
place for the time being. This sad state  
of affairs in the northern part of the  
country, is but a sample of the state of  
our industrial interests everywhere.  
The Brookfields are the great boot and  
shoe towns in the country, and there  
all business is down. T. & E. Batch-  
elder have failed. Those shops where  
any work is done, are doing but very  
little, and the profits are found on the  
wrong side of the ledger. The straw  
shops in Upton, have also stopped busi-  
ness. The people are getting seriously  
alarmed, and there is "no telling how  
long these times can be borne patient-  
ly. We have no hesitation in saying  
that our people feel sick at heart at the  
prospect before them. Black Republi-  
canism is fast dying out.

**THE EFFECTS OF THE WAR IN MAINE.**—  
The New York News, in a late issue,  
says:

An intelligent gentleman from Maine  
informs us that the war policy of Mr.  
Lincoln is becoming more and more  
canvassed in that State, and daily less  
popular. He says that ship building  
and the lumber trade are completely  
flat, and that he is at a loss to know  
what the people will do. The idea that  
England may get the carrying trade of  
the South, and that eastern vessels will  
be thrown out of employment, stands  
up like a nightmare before the people.  
The late development of English policy  
in that direction, has stimulated that  
fear, long seen in the distance by many  
as a remote possibility, but now ac-  
knowledgeed as within the range of pos-  
sibilities. At all events, great anxiety  
exists in the minds of the people of  
Maine, whose livelihood is so intimately  
associated with ship building and the  
cotton trade, the former of which al-  
ways has kept pace *pari passu* with the  
developments of the other.

**THE KING OF DAHOMEY'S AMAZON**  
GUARDS.—In the King of Dahomey's  
army, there is a body called the Amazon  
Guards. The West African Herald  
thus describes them:

They are 3,000 in number, all females,  
and display such a degree of ferocious  
blood-thirstiness and hardihood as to  
bore a greater resemblance to a host of  
mad tigers than to human creatures.  
The utterly despise death; they show  
no mercy to any living being in war;  
they are mad after blood, and seem not  
to know what fear means. They are,  
in fact, a troop of devils, so to speak,  
whose hideous wildness of manner, and  
the savage madness of whose demeanor  
in times of excitement, are so appalling  
and inhuman, as to have led many well  
judging persons to opine that these  
dreadful creatures are periodically sub-  
jected to the influence of some species  
of drug which has this effect. The dress  
of the Amazons consists of a pair of  
loose trousers, an upper garment cov-  
ering the breast, and a cap. They are  
armed with a gun, knives and daggers;  
some have blunderbuses; others long  
elephant guns, while the remainder  
carry the ordinary musket. In the military  
exercises they display good discipline,  
as well as wonderful dexterity and  
agility.
