CATHOLIC CHURCH AT NEW-ORLEANS.—We learn from the New Orleans Courier that the Bishop of New Orleans perpetually refused the use of the old Cathedral of St. Louis for celebrating the funeral ceremonies of Jackson; and also refused that the funeral orations should be delivered in the building.

When it is remembered that in this venerable church the rejoicings for the victory of the 8th were celebrated, a few days after the battle in January, 1815, and that from the associations it would recall, no place would be so proper for celebrating the funeral of the hero who saved it from desecration, and also that the committee making the request was composed of men who would hardly request any thing improper—this refusal appears very extraordinary.

We know not the reasons for the refusal, nor the points of church government or theological doctrine which may be plead in justification; nor do we know whether the refusal will be sanctioned by the Catholic Church of America as a body. But this we do know, that this refusal will do more to make the Catholics odious to our people, and will retard the progress of their church in this country more than all the intolerant tirades of the Beechers, and other bitter Protestant opponents, and more than they can repair in a century of labor.

GEN. HOUSTON.—A New Orleans correspondent of the New York Morning News, handles this individual without gloves. He says his declaration that he has been "coquetting" all along with England, is false; that he is known in Texas to be an anti-annexationist; that upon all occasions, in moments of questionable and unquestionable sobriety—in all companies—in stages, in steamboats, and at taverns—he has been known to denounce the project of annexation in the bitterest and most unmeasured terms. The writer represents him as entirely under the influence of the British and French officials—as employing, in the embassy to England, a man notoriously opposed to annexation—and as, in fine, doing every thing he could to prevent it.

We thought from the first that Gen. Houston took rather an awkward way of getting out of the scrape, and this writer confirms us in the opinion. He speaks of certain magnificent schemes of Houston as connected with the independence of Texas—such as establishing free trade in that country, and breaking us down—conquering Mexico—reveling in the halls of Montezuma, and other such stereotyped chivalric notions. The evidence is too strong against him. His recantation comes too late. He is known as a bitter anti-annexationist, and he cannot convince the world that he is any thing else. A man might get off from any charge under the same plea, and the stronger the evidence against him the better. It is like Falstaff's pretending to know the Prince, after he had convicted him of lying. It won't do!

AWFUL EXPLOSION AND DESTRUCTION OF LIFE.—On Tuesday our Levee was the scene of a horrible disaster. At about four o'clock in the afternoon, as the steamer Marquette was leaving the wharf for Cincinnati and Pittsburg, her boilers burst, and a number of persons were killed, and others were scalded and horribly mutilated. The boat was backing out at the time, and the wheels had made but a few revolutions when the accident occurred.

As is customary at such a time, a crowd of persons were on the forward deck and bow. The loss of life is not yet known, but must have been great in proportion to the numbers exposed. The boat was shattered from end to end, and sunk in a very short time after the explosion. It is to be feared that many of the wounded as well as the dead went down with her.

We are informed that the Captain believes there were about 30 cabin passengers, and about the same number of deck passengers on board. It is known that five persons were killed, seven wounded, one of them mortally, and seven missing. We saw, the last time we visited the scene, a young man 17 or 18 years of age whose grief was inconsolable, he stated that his mother was killed by the explosion; she was a deck passenger. [N. O.
