BOLIVAR THREATENED!

THE BRITISH SEND CANNON TO THE SOUTHERN CONFEDERACY!

FROM CHARLESTON, S. C.

THE REBELS IN NORTHERN MISSOURI!

It is reported that Villedginge and command is marching on Bolivar.

Jackson used a pontoon bridge built by negroes of the residents to cross Forked Deer river.

Heavy cannonading was heard at or near Bolivar on Saturday and Sunday.

On Saturday the telegraph lines were destroyed and portions of the Ohio and Mobile Railroad torn up near Humboldt. Our troops were fortifying Bolivar. A quantity of cotton lying at Fulton was protected by a gunboat.

CANNON.—Twenty-two pieces of artillery, part of the eighty pieces taken by the English from the Russians at the battle of Inkermann, and presented to the Confederacy by British merchants, (brought over in the Nashville,) have arrived at Macon. They bear evidence of having seen service. With some alterations, they will hereafter speak for themselves in a manner highly creditable.—Some thirty-eight pieces more are expected at the same place.

New York, August 2.—The Hilton Head correspondence of the Herald, dated 29th ult., says a refugee from Charleston reports Gen. Smith's command there. The rebels have sent nine infantry and two cavalry regiments to Richmond, and otherwise depleted their force by large guards on the Savannah Railroad.

Every one capable of bearing arms is forced to volunteer in the Southern army.

Two iron-clad rams, similar to the Merrimac, are being constructed in Charleston to destroy the blockaders.

The steamers Herald and Memphis had arrived from Liverpool, with valuable supplies, and the steamer Economist was expected, and had probably reached there, as a large sidewheel steamer ran in last Friday.

The fleet of Charleston has been augmented, and it is now thought impossible for vessels there to get out without capture.

The rebel steamer Nashville is covered under an eight-gun rebel battery in Dobay Sound, with the gunboats Paul Jones and Keystone State watching her.

The rebels have appeared pretty strongly posted opposite Dawfinski, and our troops have left that island.

The rebels burned the wreck of the steamer Winfield Scott on Wednesday night.

Quincy, Ill., August 2.—About one hundred and fifty rebels, under Dunn, attacked Canton, Mo., sixteen miles north of this place, last night. They shot Wm. Corney in order to get some rifles stored in his warehouse. He is not expected to live. They then took the rifles, plundered the store of what they wanted, and left. The amount of damage done has not been ascertained.

Advices have been received by Gen. Strong from Bloomfield, Mo., that about one hundred of Coleman's men were surrounded in that town by some five or six hundred rebels, and that a sharp fight was going on, and that our troops thought they could sustain themselves until reinforcements could reach them.

Letters from a rebel mail, captured at Corinth on the 29th ult., indicate a rebel movement on Chattanooga and Nashville.

An officer, writing from Harrison's Landing to a gentleman in Washington, says all is quiet on the James River. One corps after another is being received by General McClellan, and the troops make a very fine appearance.

The soldiers are in good spirits, and will be ready to deal heavy blows when the time comes to strike. If New England, the Middle States, and the Great West, only do their duty now, this wicked rebellion will be forever crushed. God grant that the call for more men will be speedily responded to.
