## The Discredited Russians

The Indianapolis Star comments:

It is the opinion of those who have observed the Russians and their methods, both at Genoa and The Hague, that all governments now have come to agree with the United States and France that soviet Russia must show that confidence could best be placed in it before financial aid could be extended; that it must, in short, give security that it would pay its honest debts—not only those obligations it is endeavoring to enter into, but those that already stand against it. In other words, the result of the two conferences was a defeat for the soviets. They simply strengthened and extended the conviction that the Russian government is not to be trusted.

It was Lloyd George's idea that if they had a chance to square themselves with the world, the sheer necessity of having money and help would drive the Russians to a decent and honest attitude. No one asked them to give up their government; no one undertook to dictate what

sort of government they should have. The substance of the ultimatum laid down to them, that as they wanted foreign enterprise and capital to get their country out of the predicament into which they have pushed it, and that as they had destroyed the industries already placed there by foreign capital, they must somehow show that they meant in good faith to balance their account and engage in business transactions on a business basis.

The Russians practically demanded the money as a right and insisted that the other nations should advance it on such terms as the soviets chose to make, which were simply not business terms at all. Their idea evidently was that capital was so keen to enter Russia, seeing the great opportunities there and the need for the good of world commerce that industries would be developed, that they would take any risks. It was a mistake. Private enterprise may go into Russia on such terms, but no extensively, it may be imagined, while governments hold back. Messrs. Lenin, Litvinoff and company have now had reasonable proof that the world outside of Moscow has no confidence in them and as there is not likely soon to be another such chance as they have had at The Hague to prove themselves anything other than a band of grasping adventurers with no real interest in the welfare of their country, they will have leisure to reflect on this verdict and devise other schemes for getting cash without a backing of moral character or visible security.

Q. Please tell me how to get a chemical analysis made of a medicine. Thank you.

A. The government does not have any fund for analyzing medicines. Persons interested in having a medicine analyzed should have it done by a private chemist.

A. The longest game in the major leagues was played on May 1, 1920. This was a National league game between Brooklyn and Boston which lasted 26 innings and ended in a tie—1-1.

### WILLIAM ALLEN WHITE

William Allen White, Kansas newspaper man and prominent in the Bull Moose uprising of 1912, has been ordered under arrest by his "pal," Governor James T. Allen.

White and Allen went through the war together doing welfare work in France. On their return White wrote up their experiences under the title, "The Martial Adventures of Henry and Me."

But now White disagrees with Allen's conception of just what the Kansas industrial court law provides and as a result he has been ordered arrested. The trouble between the pals started when White put a placard in the window of his Emporia newspaper office declaring that his sympathies were 49 percent for the rail strikers and that they would increase one percent for every day they remained out.

Allen charges that in doing this White violated the anti-picketing provision of the law.

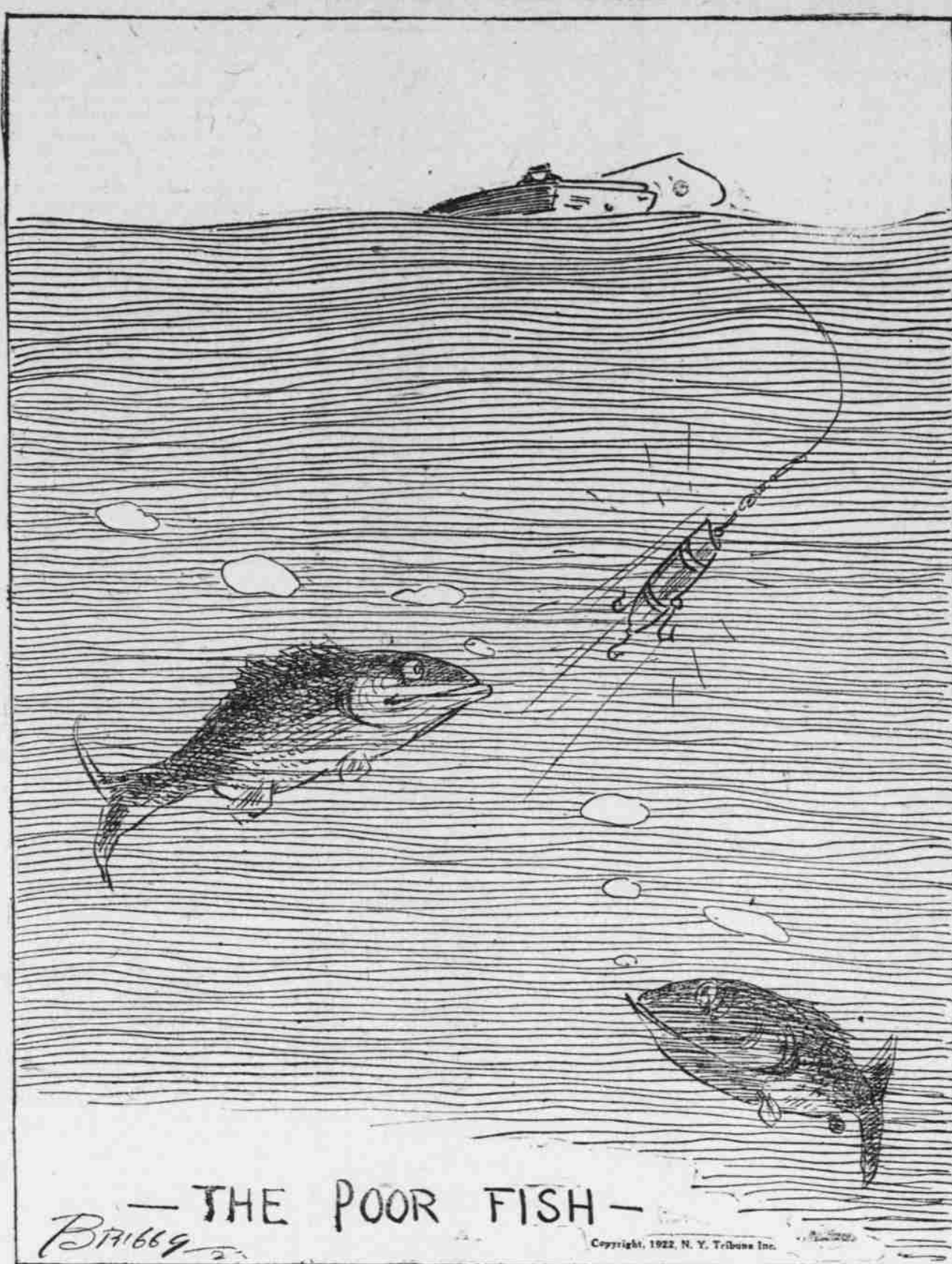

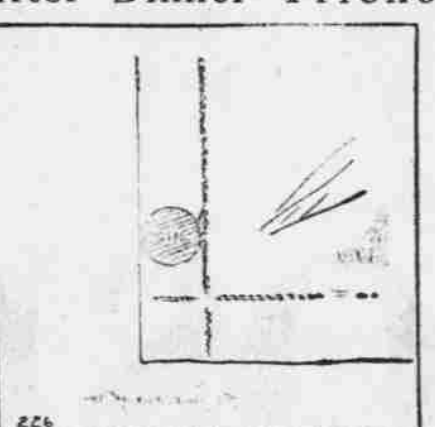

No. 226—Appearing Dime in Handkerchief

A handkerchief is spread out and shaken to show that it contains nothing. It is then crumpled up into a ball and given to a spectator to hold. When he opens up the handkerchief he finds a dime has appeared within its folds.

To perform this trick use a handkerchief with a very wide hem. A bit of the hem is loosened near one corner and a dime is slipped through the opening. This allows the dime to slide from its secret pocket and fall into the center of the handkerchief, where it is subsequently discovered.
