SENATE

The senate was not in session today.

HOUSE

After listening to the president's conversation message, the house spent the rest of its session considering the Henry resolution proposing an amendment of the constitution changing the date of presidential inauguration. Led by Mr. Perkins of New York the opponents of

the resolution showed such unexpected strength that its friends caused adjournment to prevent a vote, in which they would have been required to get a two-thirds majority. The resolution was vigorously defended by Representatives Parker of New Jersey, Henry of Texas and O'Gebel of Ohio. On the other hand, Representatives Stafford of Wisconsin, Campbell of Kansas, Harrison of New York, M. E. Driscoll of New York, Craik of Alabama, Lindbergh of Minnesota and Sissons of Mississippi spoke strongly against it. Adjourned at 4:05 until tomorrow.

The team work of the visiting team was so fast and brilliant that the Gary boys, outplayed, outclassed and tired from their exertions, stood by and watched.

Several members of the local team played hard all throughout the game, but towards the last the rest were so bewildered that the ball struck them on the head several times before they knew they were hit.

A more brilliant game has never been witnessed in Gary. The Valparaiso

aggregation worked as a single machine and their team work was the feature of accuracy and precision. Every member of the Valparaiso team displayed the highest praise. Felton and Stinchfield starred all through the contest and brought frequent bursts of applause from the audience by their brilliant playing and their accuracy in throwing baskets from different angles.

The Gary boys played the best they could, but they were simply outclassed by a better team, which bids fair to make a strong claim for the state championship.
