## SOMETHING ABOUT OUR WALLY PIPP

NEW YORK, June 28.—Wally Pipp—who would look just as well named Wallop Pipp—is the main cog around which rolls the attack and defense of the well-known and oft-cursed Yankees. Pipp, elongated exponent of third-base and home runs, was once eligible to a position as regular on Hugh Jennings' famous Tigers, but Hughie couldn't see it that way, so he is now making the boards rattle as a member of Wild William Donovan's obstreperous gang.

Pipp had a hard time convincing the fans this year that they hadn't gone a little too far and somewhat too soon when they acclaimed him a "demon" sticker. He started very, very timidly, but along about the time the White ambled into town to teach the Yankees baseball Wally and his bat got busy. The net result of his efforts was two defeats for the White Sox, and when the Browns took up the burden where Rowland's stars left off he won two games single-handed from the Fielder Jones entry. Two home runs changed off his bat at opportune moments on successive days.

Pipp is a sort of blushing gent. He is no prouder of his hits, including the home runs, than Ed Walsh used to be of his spitball. This is no prouder of a thing than the United States is of its navy. However, right there his applause ends, and, in spite of it, not because of it, he is one of the best fielders the American league holds.

For instance, Roger Peckinpaugh is accredited one of the best fielders in the American league—a man who fields and throws consistently day in and out. As a matter of fact Roger is just as likely to aim at the upper tier of boxes in right field as at first base, and that's where Pipp begins to work for the benefit of the home boys' average. He is able to stretch almost anywhere in shooting distance of first base and scoop 'em up. He does it constantly. Peckin-

paugh's errors are turned into good throws by Pipp. Likewise he scoops the bad ones up for the rest of the crowd.

## G. CARPENTIER ARRIVES IN U. S. IN TWO WEEKS

French Champion Boxer to Give Exhibitions to Boost Recruiting.

NEW YORK, June 28.—Georges Carpentier, champion heavyweight pugilist of France and an aviator in the French army, will arrive in this country within two weeks to give a series of exhibition bouts throughout the United States to boost recruiting, according to his manager, R. C. Kiegin, who has arrived on an American steamer.

Long Try to Get Furlough.  
After efforts lasting nearly four months, Carpenter succeeded in obtaining a six months furlough from the French army. His manager states that he is bringing several reels of "movies" showing the work and life of the French aviators on the western front.

"Sergeant Carpentier will give only exhibition sparring bouts, and will not seek battles with American fighters," Mr. Kiegin stated. "His mission here is to arouse enthusiasm for the French air service, and to enlist adventure-loving American to join that corps d'elite."

Bout Funds to French Charity.  
The proceeds from Carpentier's exhibition bouts and lectures will be turned over to "La Propagande Francaise," and also will be used for the construction of fast battleplanes.  
Although Kiegin stated his plans were not complete, he believed the French champion would first tour the Atlantic states, afterwards going west as far as the coast.

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## FARMERS FAIL TO TAX GRAIN

HEBRON, IND., June 28.—Tax reviewers in Cass county are unearthing a large amount of untaxed grain which farmers in that county have failed to turn in for assessment. The inquiry into the conditions existing there discloses that a number of prominent farmers have dodged the assessors to a considerable degree. One farmer was haled before the viewers Friday and it was found that he had \$2,955 worth of grain which he had failed to turn in for taxation, and \$495 on other articles, bringing the total to \$3,450. The farmer grew furious under the grueling of the board but when informed that more severe penalties might be inflicted than paying back taxes he calmed down.
