He sent word to members of the senate that turmoil arising from the wet and dry fight threatened to hold up passage of the bill a month or more.

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(By United Press.) WASHINGTON, June 29.—The Belgian mission will leave Sunday for its western tour. It will arrive in Chicago Monday morning and spend the day there, afterwards visiting Milwaukee and Green Bay.

(By United Press Cablegram.) AMSTERDAM, June 29.—Emperor Charles of Austria, told representatives of eight Austrian political parties that he was striving for peace at the earliest possible date, according to a report received this afternoon from Vienna.
