was not present at last Saturday's meeting. He received a notification of the action today. Mr. McElroy has also written the board asking for a reconsideration.

"I believe the board's move a radical and unjust one," he said today.

The Hammond principal at meeting of the board some weeks ago, Monday Hammond-Gary football game would not allow the measure to come up for discussion because of the ill-feeling it might cause between Hammond and Gary if Gary had been thrown out of state sports then.

Central Schools Sought.

The board's action is thought to have been the result of animosity against Principal Spaulding of Emerson high school.

A year ago the Gary principal demanded northern Indiana representation on the board. He asked that the state be divided into districts and each district elect its own representative. His agitation was successful and the old board of three members, which met annually at Indianapolis and ruled state athletics, was dissolved. Principal McElroy of Hammond high school was selected as this district's board member.

Ever since Gary schools have entered district sports they have been regarded as a fast lot of players in the game to win-

but always to win fair and square. It is to be regretted that a board of central high school men should dictate whether or not a northern city should remain in state competition on charges as flimsy as those that caused the barring of Gary.

This year Gary Emerson has one of the strongest basketball teams in its history and would have given any southern or central high school a race for the state scholastic championship—which might have been on reason for the hasty action.

Lake county high schools feel that the board did Gary a great injustice. There is much ill-feeling against the biased members of the board in this district and there is talk of pushing a reconsideration by the board inasmuch as the board voted Gary out when its district representative was absent.

If Gary authorities did not receive a notification of the illegality of the action it is deemed the board took a very unfair advantage of the steel city in forcing them to quit athletics until next September, thereby throwing them out of basketball, track and baseball championship series. At least the board should by all means reconsider its action and hear Gary's side of the argument.

FUEL DIRECTORS SAY THEY SHOULDN'T BE IN GAUZY

TIMES BUREAU, AT STATE CAPITAL.

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., Nov. 28.—Indiana women should not dress too "gauzy," but should wear warmer clothing, as one means of saving the state's fuel supply. This advice is contained in a statement prepared by a committee of women appointed at the recent convention at Fort Wayne of the Indiana Federation of Clubs. This committee was appointed for the purpose of offering the co-operation of Indiana club women with the state fuel administrator in his campaign to reduce the consumption of coal. Members of the committee are Mrs. Felix T. McWhittier, Indianapolis; Mrs. Alvin Fellows Bacon, Evansville; Mrs. Walter B. Hullett, New Albany; Mrs. John S. Paxson, South Bend, and Mrs. A. E. Fauve, Fort Wayne.

This committee has sent out an appeal to all women of the state and to the president of every woman's club, asking the women to co-operate in the campaign for fuel conservation.

Thin and gauzy clothing expose women to the cold, these women say, and more heat is required to keep them warm than if they wore good, warm, woolen clothing. The circular sent out by the women's committee makes the following recommendations for fuel conservation:

That wood be used as a fuel wherever possible.

That the heated rooms in every house be reduced to those necessary to the household's needs.

That women dress warmer.

That electric lights be turned off when not in use and that the maximum use be made of the "summer" on the gas range.

That clubs, churches and other organizations avoid the heating of large auditoriums when possible, by holding meetings in private residences.

That those who can afford to buy high priced coal but it and thereby release the cheaper coal to families less able to buy.

That club women in each county co-operate with the fuel administrator. That club women urge the cause of fuel conservation through newspaper interviews and articles.

BOARD PLANS IMPROVEMENTS

It is understood that the county commissioners of this county are making plans for the erection of road intersection signs at various points in the county where confusion is likely to result in regard to roads leading to the various cities.

The signs will not only contain an arrow indicating the direction to take, but will also give the mileage. These signs will be bolted on to boards attached to posts set in concrete and every effort will be made to insure a serviceable and permanent marker on the most important highways.

It is right on the line on which the Automobile Club of East Chicago has been working for the past year. This organization already has on hand a quantity of signs indicating roads to East Chicago and these signs have been placed at the service of the county to mark all roads leading into this city.

SOUTH SHORE LINE PRAISED

Following the conference at the city hall, East Chicago, Monday, with the board of works and Manager Lawrence of the Whiting Street Car line, in regard to better street car service to Whiting, President Friedman interviewed Supt. Gray of the South Shore Line in regard to extra cars between Chicago and Forxath avenue and Michigan and Guthrie streets.

Mr. Gray courteously replied at once that if more cars were needed, he would see that same were put into operation at once. It was very gratifying to members of the chamber of commerce and to patrons of the line when two large extra cars were found to be in operation at each end of the line this morning. This is considered to be a remarkably quick response on the part of the South Shore people and has been the cause of many compliments bestowed this morning on the officials of that company.

CLEANUP MEETING.

A largely attended meeting of members and friends of the East Chicago chamber of commerce, representatives of the state board of health and of the local board, doctors, and visitors from Hammond and surrounding cities was held at the Phillips hotel this noon to take up a discussion of what is to be done to clean up the congested districts of the city.

A spirited discussion took place and many interesting facts developed, full report of which will be found in these columns tomorrow.

ARREST HUNSPY AT GARY

Capt. Aydelotte Nabs Alien With Plans of Railroad Bridge Concealed in His Trunk.

John Alexander, alias John Dekta, 26 years old, believed to be a Hungarian army officer, was arrested at the Gary E. M. C. A. today by Police Capt. Thos. Aydelotte. In Dekta's possession were found plans of railway bridges and turntables of the Santa Fe and Rock Island railroads.

Complaint had been made to the police that Dekta had been making disloyal remarks. His arrest followed.

In his room was found the trunk containing plans from the Gary plant of the American Bridge company covering important railway work.

Dekta was booked as violating the president's proclamation.

VIEWERS REPORT ON ROAD

The report of the county engineer and the viewers appointed to look over Calumet avenue known technically as J. C. Becker road, in regard to improvement at township expense, reported last Saturday to the board of county commissioners that said highway was of general public utility and that the improvement of the same would be for general public benefit.

The proposed road extends from Gostlin street, at the terminus of the Lake Street improvement, south to the point one half mile south of the city limits of Hammond, making a roadway three miles in length.

The viewers recommend that this highway be improved from Gostlin street to the new proposed Calumet river bridge with water bound macadam and that the portion from the south end of the bridge to Conkey avenue be improved with reinforced concrete and that south of Conkey avenue it be improved with a surface known as asphaltic concrete which shall be laid upon the present macadam surface after the same has been scarified, reshaped and graded.

The estimated cost of the improvement is \$174,793.00.

FOUR UNDER ARREST FOR DARK DEED

Four colored people in Indiana Harbor have been arrested by the East Chicago police and charged with being accessory to the murder of Walter Madison, who was shot last Wednesday night by Earl Henderson at 5632 Pennsylvania avenue. They are James Lockett, 3545 Pennsylvania avenue; William Johnson, William Rutter and Lora Banks, 2662 Pennsylvania avenue, where Rutter keeps a boarding and rooming house. All the parties are colored.

A few sidewalk hits have been thrown on the tragedy by the story of one of the witnesses who was at the police station this morning. The facts as given are substantially as follows:

It seems that Madison owed Rutter, the boarding boss, a board bill which he refused to pay. Henderson had apparently sided in with Rutter, and thereby incurred the enmity of Madison.

Madison, who was a big, strong negro, called on Henderson several times in regard to this matter, and on the Sunday night previous to the shooting Henderson came home with cuts and bruises on his body and said that Madison had attacked him. Friends of Madison carried the report to him and he denied that he had attacked Henderson and was very much enraged at the report.

The witness said that there were several people who knew that Madison owed a gun at a Michigan avenue hardware store and, finding that the cost was too high, decided to buy a knife. He then purchased a dagger.
