CORPORATION REPLIES TO COMMITTEE

Insists There is no Flagrant Shortage and Shows Report's Errors.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 6.—There is no \$11,968.36 shortage or any shortage beyond a reasonable wear and tear and loss in bedding, towels, linen, totaling less than \$1,000 in eight months to a year's operation of a 2,000 room hotel, running on a \$900,000 annual budget, that is, a shortage in stock of wearable materials of about one-tenth of one per cent. of the annual operating expense. This is the reply made by the U. S. Housing Corporation to the report of the Senate Committee on Public Buildings and Grounds which was made public December 16.

The attorney for the investigating committee of the senate has fallen into error, apparently because of his failure to understand the making and use of an inventory. He called for an inventory of the twelve houses to be made and placed by the "matrons" of each—a totally gratuitous reflection on the management to produce a proper inventory of the form by the ordinary business methods. Actually there are eighteen buildings in the plant and a redistribution of furniture has taken place. The attorney, however, has checked these House Inventories with deliveries listed by the Purchasing and Equipment Engineers and on December 31st, just before the hearings closed, he placed in evidence a "comparison" showing an alleged shortage of \$9,968.36 and gave the U. S. Housing Corporation until noon of the next day for a rebuttal.

The comparison is a net work of the most egregious errors and mis-statements. Item by item it was checked by the General Manager of the Government Hotel and as might have been expected, from the methods used, errors in identity were frequent and no effort was made to secure responsible

Explanation for property which had been in fact moved from the custody of the House "Matrons" to other parts of the plant. Particularly surprising, however, were the errors in computation by the investigators, the adding of debits and credits and the worthlessness of the "comparison" from a business standpoint.

"One of the most flagrant mistakes was an item which showed an alleged purchase of 1,300 five cent and a shortage of 32 at \$24.85 per cent. These were 12 cars purchased but these had been transferred to the Laundry and as were not on the House "Matrons" inventory. In the "comparison" 1,300 five cent baskets as they were evidently confused with the 12 five cent. This error contributed \$79.74 to the alleged loss.

Boxes of all sizes and shapes were added together and out of 2,061 a shortage was listed of 3. There was no shortage. These three boxes had been transferred to the Operating Division as shown plainly on the delivery list in the hands of the Attorney, but so indicating the method of computation if there had been a shortage of 3 it was assumed that the missing boxes were 35 to 120 and 150 15 was withheld added to the alleged shortage.

"The attorney after submitting the "comparison" showing \$9,968.36 added another item of shortage of five extinguishers \$2,000.00. This extinguisher had not been reported by the House "Matrons" as "non-expendable property"—an excusable omission as the attorney was unable to define the meaning of this fine phrase. At any rate it seems that the extinguishers must have been confused with fire pipes as there was an overage of area.

"And yet this method of mistakes figured down to odd cents is used as the basis for a condemnatory paragraph charging criminal responsibility, not worse on the part of the U. S. Housing Corporation, since the shortage is a fragment of the \$100,000,000 based on gross errors in figuring, mistakes in identity of articles and mis-
