A. F. OF L. INTIMATES THAT RAILROADS WANTED STRIKE

RAILROAD BOARD IN SESSION

A. F. OF L. MAKES NEW CHARGES

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Intimation that the "outlaw" railroad strikes was not unwelcome by the railroad companies is made in today's issue of the weekly news letter of the American Federation of Labor, which sends official Federation news to the labor press of the country.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—The newly created railroad board is expected to take up the question of settlement of the nation-wide "outlaw" railroad strikes today.

Attorney General Palmer feels certain that the organization of the railroad labor board will have a salutary effect upon the strike and that reports which now tend to show that the strikes are waning will continue to grow more encouraging.

The question of the strike leaders rests largely with federal district attorneys. It was stated at the department of justice. District attorneys have been given orders which allow them to proceed in this matter as the evidence which they have warrants.


TWO BOND ISSUES FOR HOBART
