## SCHOOL ROW BREAKS OUT ONCE MORE

HOBART, IND., April 23—For nearly three weeks this place has been in throes of excitement over the question of the city schools. It has been rumored that the school board has been considering the employment of a new superintendent for the coming year and this does not appear to be satisfactory to the people in general and to the majority of teachers. Therefore, the school board a committee from the Woman's Reading Club, a committee from the Commercial club and a committee representing the teachers met in joint session Wednesday evening to discuss the affair and to come to some decision which would be satisfactory to the community at large and to the teachers. No definite action was taken, but it was decided to settle the matter next Monday evening when the school board would meet with the Commercial club.

A petition signed by all of the teachers except one was presented at the meeting Wednesday evening which asked to have the services of Mr. Fowble, the present superintendent, retained for the coming year.

## "OUTLAWS" TO AFFECT AN ALLIANCE

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) WASHINGTON, April 23—An alliance of all the "outlaw" railroad unions will be effected today to form a working agreement, to join forces and take united action, according to R. J. Mitchell, of the United Engineers' Association at Chicago.

Representatives of the New York and New Jersey strikers announced today they would join the alliance and work independently of the brotherhoods. The new alliance, it was stated, will have a membership of 75,000 railroad workers, representing all crafts. As soon as the railroad labor board hands down a decision on the wage demands before it, a national conference will be called of the delegates in the United States and Canada, from the organizations representing secessionists from the old-line unions.

"It is not to be a one big union," said J. P. Foley, of the Cleveland Yardmen's Association. "We're not for the 'red' stuff. We're law-abiding citizens and good Americans who are tired of supporting high paid officials who act as guards and keep the members of the

organizations under tyrannical rule. We are not sowing seeds of Bolshevism. If there are any seeds of Bolshevism being sowed it is by those who are delaying these questions."

Delegations from Pittsburgh, Chicago and St. Louis are expected for a conference to be held this afternoon.

He was shot down on entering his office after holding a conference with the state's attorney. Two men, Michael Norris and John Haley are sought in connection with the murder. They were named by Coleman in his dying statement as having "framed" the crime. Haley is said to have a police record as a labor slugger.


