MOTHERS NOW AWAIT STORK IN HOSPITALS

Situation Causes "Lying-in" Shortage in Denver—Doctors Alarmed. (INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) DENVER, April—Because Denver mothers frown upon receiving visits from the stork in their own homes, there is a lying-in shortage in the city. The hospitals are inadequate to care for expectant mothers who apply for accommodations. Local physicians declare that the "fad" prevalent in the East for some time, has reached Denver and is responsible for Denver mothers not choosing the home as place for bringing children into the world. "It seems it is no longer fashionable to use the home for parturition purposes," said Dr. Pierce van der Smith, local obstetrician. "So many women now insist upon the hospital that there is no room for them. Some will go into a ward when a private room is not available, rather than remain at home." That the "fad" has come to stay is the opinion of many physicians, who declare that the need for an institution to be used exclusively for lying-in purposes is growing daily. With women about to become mothers swamping the hospitals, there is not sufficient accommodation for other patients, it is said.

"BIG BILL" WAS READY TO SERVE

"Big Bill" Sabotich who has a record in the East Chicago city court of twenty-eight arrests, without a conviction and two federal arrests yesterday appeared at the city hall for trial before the city judge on a charge of violating the state liquor law. Before going into the court room he announced to the desk sergeant in the police station that he had made arrangements to go to Crown Point the next day to start serving thirty days. Within an hour the trial was complete and "Big Bill" had been sentenced to thirty days in the county jail and fined \$10 and costs. He left today for Crown Point. About a year ago Judge Anderson sentenced him to six months on a similar charge.

AMUNDSEN IS STILL ICE BOUND

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) WASHINGTON, April 24.—Raold Amundsen, Arctic explorer, who is attempting an expedition to the North Pole, is still ice-bound along the Colville river in Siberia, according to wireless advices to the Navy department. The latest private advices received from Amundsen were on April 6, and at that time his ship was reported to be in Siberia, with Amundsen planning to float across the Arctic Ocean and to leave his ship in 1921 for a final dash for the pole.

RIVER IS ON ANOTHER RAMPAGE

Recent rains have swelled the Little Calumet river district on South Broadway in Gary and yesterday the water reached the high mark of the season. The water which recently receded is again on a rampage, surrounding a number of houses in the lowlands to the north of the river. In places the water is now over a mile wide.
