ANOTHER STILL FOUND

The ramifications of the illicit distilling art were demonstrated further to the East Chicago police and federal prohibition officers last night when the home of Mary Sancya at 4424 Todd ave., East Chicago, was raided and Mary was found operating a still. The still was a small one of the copper boiler variety and capable of turning out very good "white mule." About one hundred gallons of mash and a couple gallons of liquor were seized.

Mary is the first female still operator who has been taken in the raids in the Twin Cities which have already netted the police and federal authorities hundreds of stills of various descriptions. The woman is a widow and her arrest has led the police to look with suspicion on other widows of the city.

NOTED ARCTIC EXPLORER REPORTED SAFE IN SIBERIA AFTER 19 MONTHS' JOURNEY

The safe arrival at Anadir, Siberia, of Captain Roald Amundsen, discoverer of the South Pole and noted explorer, is reported from Nome, Alaska, following the receipt of a wireless message from Anadir. Captain Amundsen was last seen in September, 1918, when his ship, the Maud, took on oil at Dixon Island in the White Sea. It was the explorer's intention to drive the ship as far northward as possible and allow it to become frozen in the ice in the hope that the floes would carry the vessel across the Arctic Sea and near the North Pole. There is some uncertainty as to the exact points reached by Amundsen in Siberia. Anadir is the name of a river, not a town. It is believed that the explorer may have landed on the northern coast of Siberia, making his way overland to a Russian trading post. In the course of his voyage Amundsen covered 3,600 miles. The purpose of the expedition was not to visit the North Pole, but to make scientific investigations. It is considered possible that Amundsen crossed part of the Arctic regions in an airplane with which he was equipped. He was supplied with provisions for seven years.
