K. C.'S DEFEAT WHITING CYRILS

Before a big holiday crowd at Harrison Park, the K. of C.'s easily defeated the St. Cyrils of Whiting yesterday afternoon by the score of 3 to 1.

Tommy Harle, filling in behind the bat in the absence of E. Brennan, was the leading hitter of the day, getting three safe blows out of four times at bat. Tom Tague was a close second with a single and a double out of five trips to the plate. The longest hit of the day was credited to O'Rourke who peeled off a triple to deep right center, good for two runs. In the seventh, Ralph Prendergast, the cleanup hitter, was there with a double and two bases on balls and Miller and Eddie Flynn got one hit apiece. This made a total of nine blows, good for as many runs.

Jim Dalton pitched a whale of a game, letting the visitors down to three hits and striking out fourteen of the St. Cyril swatters.

The K. of C. started after McSisak in the first frame, getting three runs with the aid of only one hit. O'Rourke started off by getting pasted with the ball and when the St. Cyril tried for a forecourt at second on Enright's hunt, all hands were safe. After Tague popped out to the first baseman Prendergast worked the pitcher for a pass, filling the bases. With the sacks loaded, Miller lined a single to right,

good for two runs. Flynn then popped to the catcher who threw into center field trying to nip Prendergast out of second base. The center folder then heaved the pill past third and Prendergast came over with the third run. In the second inning Harle scored on a single, a stolen base and an error by the third baseman.

In the sixth the K. of C. put the game on ice, scoring five runs on five hits including singles by Flynn, Harle and Tague, a triple by O'Rourke and Cyril's scored their only run in the fourth, on a hit by Raiminsky, followed by a wild throw from Harle and another by Dillon.
