KILPATRICK MAY BE BACK IN THE GAME

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., July 6.—Hoosier football fans may have an opportunity to see Kenneth Kilpatrick, former star athlete of the Emerson high school at Gary, on the gridiron this fall.

Reports current on the Indiana campus today indicate the Kilpatrick, who showed himself a star performer as a member of the Indiana university S. A. T. C. eleven in 1918, may again don the Indiana colors this fall.
Coach "Jumbo" Stehm, Indiana master, has let it be known that he would welcome the return of Kilpatrick for his return would mean the filling of a backfield position at present open.
Kilpatrick is one of the newest, headiest football players I have ever seen in action," said Coach Stehm. "His tackling is little short of wonderful. What he lacks in size and weight is more than made up in aggressiveness. His return to the Hoosier would strengthen our chances for a winning eleven this fall."
