

REASON FOR DELAY IS SOUGHT

The United Construction Company of Hammond, recently given a jolt by the property owners of West Fifth avenue, Gary, who threaten to sue the company's bondsmen for default of contract when the company failed to pave 3 1/2 miles of thoroughfare, will be further alarmed to know that the Hammond Board of Public Works has decided to call officials of the company on the carpet for an explanation of the delay in paving Sibley, Summer and other streets here.

Evidently word of the board's agitation over the matter has not been relayed to the construction company. Messrs Swanson, Dietrich and Wilke, yesterday waited two hours for officials of the company to appear. The trio compromise Hammond's Board of Public Works and when they left "hold the bar" for the second time yesterday afternoon the gentlemen were considerably agitated.

Work on the reinforcement of Oakley and Plummer street pavements is not underway and no hope of beginning the work is held out by officials of the United Construction Co., who say that lack of material is retarding construction companies all over the country.

City Engineer William Bridge looks upon the situation as not serious. "There's no cause for alarm," he says. "When the company gets around to it they'll repair the streets."

GARY SUIT SET FOR JULY 19

MICHIGAN CITY, July 15.—An adjourned term of the Porter superior court will be held in Valparaiso July 19th by Judge H. L. Crumpacker. The purpose of the term is to take up unfinished business left over from the regular term. Arguments will be made by the attorneys in the case of Reif vs. Fletcher, suit to foreclose a mortgage of \$30,000 on the palatial home of Millionaire Louis A. Bryan, at Island Park, near Gary. The evidence was heard in Valparaiso a year ago and was continued from term to term. Reif, who was a famous jockey, loaned the firm of Fletcher & Weidner, \$30,000 on the Gary property and when it became due sought to collect it. Bryan had been in negotiations with Fletcher & Weidner for the exchange of some California land. In the negotiations he placed a deed to the Gary property in escrow as collateral. In some manner the two men got the deed on record and obtained the loan from Reif.






