

REV. EDWARD BARRETT CELEBRATES HIS 25th JUBILEE LAST NIGHT

On the anniversary of the 25th year of his ordination and in celebration of his 25 years as pastor of All Saints' church here, Father Edward F. Barrett yesterday evening was presented by his parishioners with a purse of \$200.00 as a token of their love and esteem and were in turn surprised by the recipient when in his speech of acceptance, he informed them that a new church edifice had passed the stages of contemplation and was now practically assured.

Visibly moved at the wonderful display of the loyalty and love of his congregation, Father Barrett looked down into the faces of his people last night from his place on the rostrum of All Saints' hall and in a few brief remarks thanked them for their generosity, their faith in him, and their sincere co-operation, which he said, have made his pastorate a success and the arduous duties of his calling a cross easier to bear.

The presentation speech was made by John J. Malloy, who dwelt on the early difficulties of the parish, the problems confronting the young priest, the building of the schools and all the attendant obstacles which were overcome, one by one, by Father Barrett, until at the present time All Saints' parish has the reputation of being one of the best organized on the Ft. Wayne diocese.

Yesterday's program was inaugurated by high mass at which Father Barrett was celebrating with Father Berg, arch priest; Father F. A. McNerny of Pembroke, Can., deacon and Father Leonard DuFrane, of Peru, Ind., sub-deacon. More than 15 priests, old school mates and friends of Father Barrett were in attendance. Father R. E. Kelly, of Huntington, Ind., delivered an eloquent sermon touching upon the duties, sacrifices and dignity of the priesthood. Father Kelly, who is associate editor of "Our Sunday Visitor," a weekly newspaper of national reputation, unfolded, before the crowded church, the responsibilities of a pastor, the unflinching bravery and steadfastness which his high calling demands and the necessity of co-operation of pastor and parish.

Preceding the evening's entertainment the visiting clergy and Father Barrett's two sisters and brother of

MEMPHIS FIREMEN TENDER RESIGNATIONS

[INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE] MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 15.—Two hundred and thirty-three members of the Memphis Firemen's Union have declined to withdraw their resignations tendered in a body last night to become effective tomorrow at noon. The American Legion, Memphis Automobile Dealers' Association and the various civic bodies and large industrial plants are preparing to supply the city with a sufficient number of trained fire fighters and experienced chauffeurs to man the motorized fire-fighting equipment and prevent the city from being left without fire protection. The firemen are quitting because of the inability of the city to meet their salary demands which are predicated on a \$120 base for beginners, automatically increasing to \$135 per month.

NEW LAREDO IS ATTACKED

[INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE] SAN ANTONIO, Tex., July 15.—Ricardo Gonzales, at the head of a force of more than 300 rebels, began an attack on Nuevo Laredo, opposite Laredo, Texas, at 5 o'clock this morning. This information was contained in authentic advices just received here. The beleaguered town is being defended by a force of about 200 loyal Huerta troops. Gonzales' forces were combined at 6 o'clock this morning with about 400 filibusters, under the command of Gen. Garza, who forded the Rio Grande at a point 10 miles west of Laredo. Customs guards revolted and joined the attacking party.

Former A. E. F. Officer Who Confesses He Killed Wife and "Hold-up" Accomplice

"I want to hang and get through with it all," said Carl Wanderer, former machine gun commander, after he had confessed to the Chicago authorities that he had killed his wife and John J. Maloney, a circus canvasser and ex-soldier whom he hired to act as a "hold-up" man to cover his deed. Several weeks ago Wanderer told a story of how when he and his wife were returning from a theatre they were attacked by an unknown man who shot and killed her and was then killed by Wanderer in self defense. After a recent grilling by the police and the States Attorney he broke down and confessed that he had staged the hold-up in order to get rid of his wife and killed his accomplice to cover the crime. GERMANY FINALLY ACCEPTS THE TERMS

SERVICE) SPA July 15.—Germany has accepted the terms of the allied coal protocol calling for the delivery of 2,000,000 tons of coal monthly by the Germans on certain conditions; it was announced today. The proposals formulated by the Germans on the issue of coal deliveries was handed to Premier Lloyd-

George and guarantee the delivery of 12,000,000 tons of coal in six months, at the rate of 2,000,000 tons per month if the allies provide additional food for the German coal miners and pay higher prices for German coal than was first stipulated. Dr. Walter von Simons, the German foreign secretary, denied that any ultimatum was presented to the Germans by the allies, but it is well understood that the allies prepared the draft of an ultimatum. The Germans proposed that at the end of six months the reparations commission shall determine whether Germany is to continue delivering 2,000,000 tons of coal monthly.
