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**REFUGES POUR INTO GERMANY**  
While the French foreign office reported that the Polish counter offensive in Volhynia had collapsed, private dispatches from Warsaw today said that Polish operations were pro-

ceeding favorably. The Poles were reported to have re-captured Brody, but this has not been confirmed and is doubted in military circles.

Great numbers of Polish refugees are pouring across the Prussian frontier into Germany. Berlin reported today that 2,000 Poles had reached here from Warsaw and others were arriving.

**ITALY IS CAUTIOUS**  
Italy fears entanglements in the Eastern European war and is taking steps to prevent it. The following dispatch was received from the Berlin bureau of the International News Service:

"It is learned that the Italian ambassador has requested the German government to arrange immediately for the withdrawal of Italians from the East Prussian plebiscite territory to prevent Russo-Italian incidents."

Allied military experts frankly admit that they are puzzled as to how troops could be sent into Poland. The Russian army of invasion in Poland is closing the corridor between Warsaw and Lantzig, the only free artery of traffic between Poland and the outside world. Germany has proclaimed neutrality and announces she will not allow allied troops to cross her soil into Poland. It would not be feasible to attempt to send troops by way of Austria and Czechoslovakia.

A Warsaw dispatch dated Wednesday, said that the twenty members of the Polish armistice commission had returned from Baranovitchi and were conferring with the Polish council of national defense on the Russian demand that the Polish envoys be empowered to discuss peace terms as well as the truce. This dispatch admitted that the Russians had crossed the Bug river in their sweep toward the Polish capital from the North, but said that the Polish battle line west of Brest-Litovsk was holding firm. South of Brest-Litovsk the Poles were carrying out an orderly retreat while making strong counter attacks against the Russians in the Brody sector of Galicia and Volhynia.

**LA FAYETTE, Ind., August 5.**—Wonders are being accomplished in the reclamation of arid lands in the far west, according to Representative Will R. Wood, Tenth District congressman in this city after a six weeks' trip through Pacific mountain states as a member of the congressional committee sent out to investigate the waste land irrigation projects and national park highways.

Mr. Wood is enthusiastic in his approval of what is being accomplished in reclaiming waste land, and in his description of the wonderful scenery found in the national parks of the west. He said that the former deserts are destined to become the nation's "chief bread basket." He told of the wonderful production which he saw in areas where irrigation had been practiced for a term of years.

Ten tons of alfalfa are being harvested annually from a single acre, and land is producing 120 bushels of oats, sixty bushels of wheat and 400 bushels of potatoes to an acre. Other crops are in proportion.

**IRRIGATION WORKS BIG CHANGES.**  
"In western Nevada, along the Oregon trail, where once the Indiana massacred immigrants in their way to California, we found miracles performed in the reclamation of desert land," Mr. Wood said. "On one side of the road where water had been applied, I saw the greatest crops I ever looked on. On the other side of the road, where there had been no irrigation, nothing was to be seen but sand, cactus and sage brush. We inspected millions

of acres just as susceptible to cultivation as those which have been made to produce huge crops. It will take a lot of money to reclaim them all and the process will be slow, but eventually these lands, now deserts, will feed the great states of America."

Mr. Wood was accompanied by seven other congressmen. The party left Chicago June 20th, and traveled 7,000 miles by train and 3,000 miles by automobile. It visited sixteen irrigation projects in Nebraska, Nevada, Colorado, California, Oregon, Idaho, Wyoming and Montana.

The committee is composed of the members of the sub-committee of the general appropriations committee. They were accompanied by the director of reclamation and the national forester.

**LAUDS SCENERY OF NATIONAL PARKS.**  
In addition to inspecting the waste and irrigated lands, they visited eight national parks. Mr. Wood says these wonderful spots are not appreciated by the people of the United States. He said they were far more wonderful than the Alps, and that such scenery is not to be found in any other part of the world.

Mr. Wood will leave here Monday for Washington to attend the committee meeting for the fixing of salaries for federal employees. He will deliver his first Republican presidential campaign speech at Staunton, Va., on August 12, and will return here Aug. 15 to start the campaign in Indiana.

**POLISH BABIES DIE BY HUNDRED**  
PARIS, Aug. 5.—Hundreds of babies have died in their mothers arms in the sight of Polish refugees before the Bolshevik advance into Poland, according to a Warsaw dispatch to Red Cross

headquarters here today. The telegram said that Poland is threatened with famine next winter, regardless of the outcome of the Russo-Polish negotiations. The sky behind the battle front is black with the smoke of burning houses. It is regarded as certain in Warsaw that a large part of the crops have been destroyed.
