At the Marion club—and not from the porch of the Harding home—they were listening to an impromptu address by the senator.


The gathering was to be under the auspices of the Ohio State Editorial Association. Both republican and democratic editors were to be present.

COURT LEAK EXPOSURE CASE HEARD

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Attorneys for the defendants in the sensational supreme court "leak" case are trying to quash the indictment against their client, it became known today. They have filed a demurrer to the proceedings, which is the first step toward having the case null-proposed.

The case is set for trial at the fall term of the District supreme court. The next step after filing a demurrer would be to set a date for a hearing of the objections of defendants counsel before the trial. However, no date has been set.

The four men indicted are Ashton F. Embury, James H. Graves, Barrett E. Moses and Millard Mayer, alias E. Millard Mayer, Jr. They were indicted following the exposure by the International News Service of a "leak" by which pending decisions of the U. S. supreme court were alleged to have been allowed to dribble out to a small coterie of men who are alleged to have used the information for speculation in stocks in New York.

District Attorney John E. Lasker, in whose hands the case was placed by officials of the department of justice, is handling the preparation of the case personally and it was stated in his office today that the prosecutions would be pushed to a conclusion as rapidly as possible.

Most of the investors were from New Bedford, where the Old Colony office was closed by order of Dist. Atty. Kenny. Threats of violence were freely made and President C. M. Bright well of the company, kept in his inn office.



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POLES LEAVE FOR RUSS LINE TO NEGOTIATE

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) WARSAW, Aug. 13.—Via London, Aug. 13.—A Polish delegation with full powers to negotiate an armistice and peace preliminaries, will cross the Russo-Polish lines near Siedlce, Saturday afternoon at 5 o'clock, it was announced tonight. The Poles will go direct to Minsk.

The wireless misunderstanding between Warsaw and Moscow were finally cleared up today following the return of the Polish envoys who had set out for Minsk.

The Polish delegates reported that they were hospitably received at the village of Lesice, 74 miles east of Warsaw, by a Russian mission headed by Comissar Mullin. The Russian officials were accompanied by a body guard wearing black leather uniforms and black caps.

Discussions at Lesice resulted in definite plans for the parley at Minsk on Saturday.

FARMER CHARGED WITH DAUGHTER'S DEATH

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE) HEBRON, MINN., Aug. 13.—Fred Bostelmann, a well-to-do farmer, is in jail here today, charged with the murder of his 19 year old daughter, Frieda, because he objected to the man she was about to marry. It is alleged that Bostelmann injected strychnine into the girl's body with a hypodermic needle.

According to evidence adduced against the father at a coroner's inquest, he warned her against her approaching marriage to W. J. Butzke, a young school teacher.

"The day of your marriage to Butzke will be the day of your funeral," the father is said to have told his daughter. The funeral took place the day after the marriage date.

The day before the marriage, according to the authorities Bostelmann took his daughter for a ride, ostensibly to see Butzke.

They returned home an hour later with the girl in convulsions. The inquest revealed strychnine in her body, but not in her stomach.

Health is Happiness. If You Are Thin your diet should invariably include rice, potatoes, carrots, parsnips, artichokes and well prepared cereals, fresh eggs, cream, milk, veal that is not too young, beef, lamb and mutton. Preserved figs are wholesome, easily digested and good flesh builders. All meats should be broiled or roasted rather than stewed or fried. The important thing for the thin man or woman to remember is that it is the food taken between meals that is most important in adding flesh and that five meals a day (if they are all light) are not too many for the person who wants to gain weight.

A Spanish Flesh Reducer

In some parts of Spain it is firmly believed that a bonbon made in the following way is the surest and safest flesh reducer: Take a quantity of the kernels of the black cherry and coat each with an icing made of white of egg and sugar. Dry in the sun and eat three or four every day.

To Keep the Hair from Turning Gray

Boil 60 grammes genuine claret with one ounce and a half of iron for one minute. Wash the hair twice a week with this lotion, allowing it to dry on the hair.

For the Hands

A paste made of powdered chalk and sweet almond oil spread thickly on the hands at night for two or three nights will improve their appearance greatly; almond and chestnut meal, oatmeal and bran are all useful for whitening the hands.

For the Voice

To clear the throat before singing or speaking, mix a tablespoonful of lemon juice with a small quantity of glycerine and take a teaspoonful just

before you expect to sing or speak extensively.

To Soften the Skin

Make a paste of 3 ounces ground barley, 1 ounce honey and the white of an egg. Spread this at night over cheeks, nose and forehead and wash off in the morning with tepid water.

A Cream for the Lips

To soften and restore color to the lips, use the following preparation: Place 15 grammes of olive oil in a double boiler and when warm melt in it 15 grammes white wax. Place 2 grammes alkanet chips in a piece of coarse muslin and allow it to remain in the mixture an hour. Strain and add three drops essence of roses. Bottle.

To Keep the Gums in Good Condition

An unusually good mouth wash is made by mixing 125 grammes wound-water, 15 grammes compound spirits of horseradish and two drops essential oil of cloves. Dilute freely with water and use as a wash for mouth and gums.

Portugal Extract for the Hair

A preparation called Portugal extract used daily makes the hair fine and lustrous and keeps it in a state of moisture favorable to growth as well as neutralizing the disagreeable odors of perspiration. It is made by adding essential oil of oranges in any proportion desired to 36 per cent alcohol, and keeping the mixture closely covered in a warm place for a few weeks. Add a few drops to a little water and moisten the comb with it; then apply the mixture without diluting it to the brush for brushing the hair.
