## SPECULATE ON TOURNEY'S OUTCOME

TOLEDO, O., Aug. 13.—A thrilling international finish was assured today when the final 36 holes for the American open golf championship was shot at the Inverness Country club. The most celebrated golfers played up to form in the first two rounds of play and were bunched within a few shots of one another at the top of the field.

Many here believe the real fight for the title will be between Harry Vardon and Ted Ray, the Englishmen, and Walter Hagen, the American champion. While Jock Hutchison, Leo Diegel and Jim Barnes topped the Britons going into the final rounds, it was thought that Hagen, the home-bred champion, would furnish the real fight against the Englishmen in the final round.

Vardon, Ray and Hagen were tied at 147 shots each when today's play started, while Jock Hutchison led the field at 145 with Diegel and Jim Barnes tied for second. Eddie Lock, at 149, Chick Evans, Jr. and Bob McDonald at 150 and other good players such as Bobby Jones, Mike Brady, Freddie McLeod and Louis Teller were not so far behind as to be out of the running. A lot can happen in 36 holes.

Golf enthusiasts from many cities came to Inverness today to witness the stars shoot for the title. Automobiles were parked in all available spaces near the club house. The gallery numbered around six thousand.

The weather was threatening. In the event of a tie for first place at the end of 72 holes there will be a play off for the title Saturday morning at 10 holes.



## Club After Grafting Constables

Constables in several cities over the state are reported collecting no small sums from tourists in automobiles by charging speeding and permitting the tourists to "pass on" after payment of a "bond" ranging from \$2.00 to \$20.00, according to an investigation now being conducted by the Automobile and Good Roads Bureau of the Gary Commercial club, which is taking active steps in Gary to protect both local drivers and visitors from the practice.

It is reported that the constables take a fine when a small bond is the only stake and thus "get away" with totals of from \$100 to \$250 in one Sunday. The Gary Commercial club feels that this is not only unjust but also drives tourists away from the cities in which such "hold-ups" occur. The club has issued a notice asking all motorists to report to the club at once when a constable makes an arrest in order that steps may be taken immediately to protect drivers from the game.

Constables operating in a similar manner near the Illinois state line were traced down, trapped and indicted and the Gary organization proposes to see that every arrest is legitimate or the constable properly prosecuted if holding methods are used.

## OLYMPIC ENTER PROTEST

Canadian hurdler, has been denied, but the committee may lodge another protest against the entry of the Canadian boxers.


